SHOOTING HOURS GAME BIRDS

PHEASANTS: The hunting of PHEASANTS is only permitted in M.A. Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 13, 14 and 15 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time from October 5 to October 27, and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific Standard Time from

HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGES: The hunting of HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGES is only permitted in M.A. Nos. 5, 6 and 7 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time from October 5 to October 27, and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific Standard Time from October 28 to November 17.

QUAIL: The hunting of QUAIL is only permitted in M.A. Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 14 and 15 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time rom October 5 to October 27, and from 8 a.m. to December 31.

BAG LIMITS

The bag limits for game as set out in these regulations designate the maximum number that may be killed by a person during the periods of

BIG GAME

MULE (BLACKTAIL) DEER: In M.A. Nos. 1 2, 3, 4, 10, 12, 13 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 25, three (3) deer of which two (2) may be antlerless. In M.A. Nos. 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, 27 and 28, two (2) deer of which one (1) may be antlerless. In M.A. Nos. 8 two (2) deer, both of which may be antlerless. NO PERSON SHALL TAKE IN THE AGGREGATE MORE THAN THREE (3) DEER IN THE PROVINCE except in

WHITETAIL DEER: In M.A. No. 8 three (3) deer each of which may be antlerless. In M.A. Nos. 10, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 20, three (3) deer of which two (2) may be antierless. In M.A. Nos. 5, 6, 7, 9, 11 and 28, two (2) deer of which one (1) may be antierless. NO PERSON SHALL TAKE IN THE AGGREGATE MORE THAN THREE (3) DEER IN THE PROVINCE.

MOOSE: In M.A. No. 28 and in that portion of M.A. No. 21 below the highwater mark of the Peace River Dam, season bag limit, two (2) Throughout the remainder of the Province, sea son bag limit, one (1). Provided that in the aggregate no person shall take more than two (2)

MOUNTAIN GOAT: Season bag limit in M.A. Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 11, one (1). Throughout the remainder of the Province, two (2) provided that in the aggregate no person shall take more than two (2) goats throughout the Province.

CARIBOU: Throughout the Province, season

SHEEP (Rams only): Throughout the Province, season bag limit, one (1)

GRIZZLY BEAR: Throughout the Province the maximum number which may be taken in any one calendar year is one (1).

BLACK BEAR: Throughout the Province, the maximum number which may be taken in any one calendar year is two (2) except in M.A.'s 13 to 15 where there is no limit.

QUAIL: In M.A. No. 1, ten (10). In the remainder of the Province, fifteen (15).

POSSESSION LIMIT: Provided that no person while in the field either actually hunting or re turning from hunting, shall have in his pos-session game birds in excess of three times the daily bag limit prescribed for the species in the area in which the said game birds were taken.

DEFINITIONS

RESIDENT means a person who is domiciled in the Province, and who has resided in the Province for the immediately preceding six (6)

GAME includes all big game, game birds and

BIG GAME means any Mountain Sheep, Mou tain Goat, Caribou, Elk, Moose, Deer, Grizzly bear, Black bear, Cougar, Wolf or Coyote.

CANCELLED TAG-LICENCE means one from which the portions bearing the month and the day of the month have been removed, by the hunter, to indicate the date the animal was

FIREARMS include any gun using, as a propellent: explosives, compressed air or gas and bows or cross-bows.

"DEER FAMILY" means Moose, Caribou, Deer

%-CURL HORN means the horn of a mature mountain-sheep, the tip of which has grown through 270 degrees of the circle described by the outer surface of the horn, as seen from the

ANTLERLESS ANIMAL means a female or

tuberances on male fawns and calves do not con stitute antlers. Such animals are antlerless for the purpose of these regulations. Over one year of age refers to a member of the deer family bearing visible antlers.

EVIDENCE OF SEX means during the males only season evidence of sex is required on all members of the DEER FAMILY and MOUNTAIN SHEEP. Due to differential antlerless seasons throughout the Province, hunters are urged, for their own protection, to leave adequate evidence of sex on all Big Game animals killed.

This can best be done by: (a) leaving the head on the carcass;

(b) in males, leaving a testicle or recognizable portion of the penis on the quarters;

(c) in females, leaving a portion of the udder

FIREARMS RESTRICTIONS

Most Municipalities have local by-laws restricting or controlling the use of firearms within their boundaries. Hunters are advised to consult Municipal Clerks for details of closures.

NOTICE TO HELICOPTER PILOTS

Helicopter pilots are required when transport ing hunters, fishermen, trappers, game or fish, to report to the Fish and Wildlife Branch, Parliament Bldgs., Victoria, B.C., on forms provided within seven (7) days of the completion of each

LICENCE REQUIREMENTS

ANY PERSON OF ANY AGE must take out a hunting licence if he hunts wildlife in British Columbia. There is no special fee for young people. In addition, a person under 18 must sub-mit an acknowledgement of responsibility signed by a parent or guardian before obtaining a hunting licence. A person under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a person 21 or over when carrying a firearm.

NON-RESIDENTS of the Province hun ing big-game, except wolf, cougar and must be accompanied by a licence of the hunt non-residents must have their licence endorsed by their guide. Failure to do so constitutes an offense on the part of both hunter and guide.

"Any NON-RESIDENT HUNTER, in order to export trophies secured, must obtain a permit for this purpose from any Conservation Officer or Government Agent. This permit will be issued upon payment of the fees due on trophies being exported as set forth in the regulations. Trophy fees are payable on any or all big game killed whether exported or otherwise

TROPHY FEES








Mule deer antlers are "branched."



The mule (blacktail) deer can be identified by its black-tipped tail and surrounding white rump patch. Arrow indicates large scent gland.




Whitetail deer antlers are formed by a number of tines arising from a main beam

GAME REGULATIONS — 1968-69

For the purpose of defining the open seasons, for big game and game birds, the Province shall be divided into Management Areas (M.A.'s) as established by Order-in-Council Number 335 approved January 27, 1967.

The open seasons declared by these Regula-

tions shall cease to be in effect in any area covered by a closure order issued by the Forest Service of the Department of Lands, Forests and Water Resources and shall continue to be in effective during the period covered by such forest closure order.

SCHEDULE I OPEN SEASONS

The open seasons for the hunting or killing of each species and class of game shall be that set forth in Schedule I and Schedule II. All dates mentioned in these Regulations are inclusive.

Where seasons in Schedule I do not apply to complete Management Areas (M.A.'s) they are marked by a star (*) or a notation and these seasons, with descriptions of the periods and areas involved are contained in Schedule II.



(a) in that portion of Provincial Management Area Number 1 below the highwater mark in those waters of Vancouver Island known as Brentwood Bay and Tod Inlet extending south of a straight line running east and west from Sluggett Point to Willis Point;

(b) in that portion of Provincial Management Area Number 1 known as Ganges Harbour below the highwater mark lying north of a straight line running from Scott Point due west to the nearest point on the west shoreline of said harbour;

(c) in that portion of Provincial Management Area Number 1 known as Sooke Harbour below the highwater mark; commencing at the east corner of Lot 1, Section 7, Plan 5028; thence in a southeasterly direction approximately 120° to Hill Head; thence in a westerly direction along highwater mark to underwater cable crossing shown on Plan 2033.05 fronting on Section 134; thence northerly approximately 16° to west corner Lot 1, Section 7, Plan 8317, marked by cable pole; thence in an easterly and northerly direction along highwater mark to point of commencement;

(d) in that portion of Provincial Management Areas Numbers 13, 14 and 15 described as follows: All waters of the North Thompson, South Thompson and Thompson Rivers bounded on the north by the Canadian National Railways Bridge at Kamloops Junction; and on the east by the Kamloops East Bridge; and on the west by the Overlander Bridge;

(e) in that portion of Provincial Management Area Number 14 described as follows: Commencing at the northeast corner of Lot 341; thence southerly following the line fence to the southeast corner of Lot 341 at the lowwater mark; thence westerly following the shoreline at the lowwater mark, to the southwest corner of Lot 343 on lake-shore at the lowwater mark; thence northerly along west boundary of Lot 343 to the northwest corner of Lot 343; thence easterly along the north boundary of Lots 343 and 342 to the northeast corner of Lot 342; thence southerly to the intersection with the Tranquille-Criss Creek Road; thence easterly along the north boundary of said road to the intersection with the Canadian National Railway line; thence easterly along said line to a point directly due north of the northeast corner of Lot 341; thence south to the point of commencement;
