A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

Hunters in British Columbia have access to game species unsurpassed on this continent in variety and abundance. This province also boasts some of the most spectacular opportunities for experiencing nature and wildlife in its natural habitat.

The Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks is committed to maintaining British Columbia's wildlife and the public's opportunity to enjoy it. The conservation of wildlife and wildlife habitat is a key element in my Ministry's program to maintain this resource and provide sustainable-use opportunities.

The Ministry's Habitat Conservation Fund program, which is funded primarily by hunters and freshwater anglers through a surcharge on hunting and angling licence sales, plays an important part in providing for the protection and enhancement of wildlife and its habitat. The funding support

for this year's HCF projects totalled \$3,100,000.

I am also pleased to report that several supplemental funding initiatives, recently approved for the 1994/95 fiscal year, will provide additional monies for wildlife management and resource inventory projects. This funding will also contribute to increased staffing in the Ministry's wildlife and enforcement programs.

Of further importance to wildlife management is the ongoing development of provincial timber harvesting standards. The recently-published Forest Practices Code and its resulting rules and standards will ensure that wildlife habitat concerns are recognized and addressed prior to the approval of logging plans. New appointments of Forest Ecosystem Specialists in various forest districts throughout the province, and the approval of a forest renewal accord will also result in increased monitoring of forest harvesting practices.

On behalf of the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks and the Government of British Columbia, I invite you to share in the natural wonder which is British Columbia.

MAJOR REGULATION CHANGES

Provincial

- The bag limit for wolves will be reduced to 3 in all Regions and the season modified to provide protection to females with young pups.
- The regulation prohibiting the baiting of bears is expanded. See page 6, item 41, for details.
- The regulation concerning retrieval of edible portions of game is expanded. See page 6, item 33, for details.
- Band-tailed pigeons will be closed across the province due to concerns about their status in British Columbia.
- The bag limit for mourning doves will be reduced and the season shortened. These restrictions result from continued indications of a population decline.
- · See "Highway No Shooting and No Hunting Areas", page 78.
- Discharge of a firearm near residences and buildings is permitted under special circumstances, page 78.

ON THE COVER... The Canada goose is probably the most recognizable bird in all of North America. Its flights are the harbinger of spring and winter to many people, while it is prized by hunters for its wariness, size and table qualities. It is highly adaptable and can reproduce prolifically in close proximity to human communities. Canada geese are the only geese that nest naturally in British Columbia, where approximately 15,000 breeding pairs are estimated to produce about 42,000 young each year. 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HUNTING REGULATIONS

SECTION A

ALLOCATION OF THE ANNUAL ALLOWABLE HARVEST

In 1985, after extensive discussion with representatives of the B.C. Wildlife Federation, the Guide Outfitters of B.C. and the Federation of B.C. Naturalists, the BC Environment established a set of policies and procedures to guide ministry staff, representatives of guide outfitters and resident sportsmen in the allocation of the Annual Allowable Harvest of game animals.

POLICIES/PROCEDURES

There are several policies and procedures which relate to allocation of the allowable harvest of game animals. To completely understand the allocation process the following policies must be considered together:

- · setting the "Allowable Harvest";
- establishing "Open Seasons";
 effecting the "Allocation of Hunting Privileges":
- · issuing permits for residents to accompany non-residents through "Permit Allocation-Non-Resident (Canadian and alien) Hunting":
- · setting non-resident hunter limits under "Quota Allocation - Guided Hunting";
- · setting resident hunter limits under "Limited Entry Hunting"; and
- · considerations for allocations which may result in harvest overruns or stockpiling of unharvested animals under the "Wildlife Harvest" policy.

Key factors in the application of these policies and procedures include:

- consultation with representatives of guide outfitters and resident sportsmen prior to a regional manager setting allocations for resident and non-resident hunters.
- consideration of Aboriginal peoples' interest will be given within the context of government policies being developed.
- no allowable harvest will exceed the level of harvest needed to ensure the conservation of the wildlife resource:
- · allowable harvests are set to meet wildlife objectives for hunting and non-hunting uses:
- · harvest allocations are only considered where the allowable harvest is reached or may soon be reached;
- · resident hunters are given priority over non-resident hunters; and
- · allocations are set for three (3) year periods where feasible.

IT IS UNLAWFUL

- to enter, hunt over or trap in cultivated land, posted land or private property without the owner's permission.
- 2. to make a false statement to an Officer. Conservation Officer, or Constable.
- 3. to hunt at any time during the year except within the open season, or by authority of a permit issued under the Wildlife Act.
- to use another person's licence or permit, or to loan or transfer any licence or permit under any circumstances.
- 5. to be in possession of a big game animal without a properly cancelled species licence or otherwise by licence, permit, or as provided by regulation.

- to continue to hunt game species on a day in which the daily bag limit of that species has been taken, or, on the day or subsequent to the day on which the seasonal bag limit for that species of game has been taken.
- 7. to hunt moose, elk, mountain sheep, mountain goat, caribou or grizzly bear with a shotgun. (Shotguns may be used only for the hunting of deer, black bear. cougar, coyote, wolf, game birds and small game.) NOTE: A person using a shotgun for hunting deer, black bear, cougar and wolf must use a bore size of 20 gauge or larger and use shells of shot size 1 Buck or larger.
- to hunt game birds with a rifle, except grouse and ptarmigan.
- to hunt migratory game birds using a rifle, or a shotgun loaded with a single bullet, or any other weapon except a bow and arrow or a shotgun not larger than number 10 gauge.
- 10. to use, while hunting migratory game birds, more than one shotgun, unless each shotgun in excess of one, is disassembled or unloaded and encased.

- to hunt with a set gun, or to hunt wildlife with a pump, repeating or auto-loading shotgun without a plugged magazine incapable of holding more than two shells.
 - 12 to use full metal jacketed, non-expanding, tracer, incendiary or explosive bullets for hunting game.
 - to use rimfire cartridges for hunting big game
 - to hunt migratory birds from a power boat.
 - to shoot wildlife from a motor vehicle or a boat propelled by a motor.
 - 16. to discharge, carry or have in possession a firearm containing live ammunition in its breech or in its magazine, in or on a railway car, motor vehicle, sleigh, aircraft, or bicycle.
 - to carry a cocked crossbow in or on a vehicle, or to discharge a bow from a vehicle of any kind.
 - 18. to hunt wildlife by the use or with the aid of a light or an illuminating device.
 - to hunt or transport hunters or wildlife by helicopters.
 - 20. to hunt wildlife from an aircraft.
 - to hunt game within six (6) hours of being airborne in an aircraft other than a regularly scheduled commercial aircraft.
 - 22. to use a power boat, aircraft, or motor

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- vehicle to disturb game for the purpose of driving them towards another hunter.
- to hunt game, except migratory game birds, from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise.
- to hunt migratory game birds from 1/2 hour after sunset to 1/2 hour before sunrise.
- to hunt, take, wound or kill big game while it is swimming unless it has been previously wounded.
- to use poison for the taking or killing of any wildlife.
- to use recorded or electronic calls to hunt wildlife (no exemption for trappers).
- to possess or keep in captivity any wildlife without a permit.
- 29. to possess or wantonly take, injure or destroy a bird, egg, or the nest of a bird except those designated by regulations, (ie: crows, English sparrows, cowbirds, magpies, Rock doves or European starlings or their eggs or nests).
- 30. to buy or sell migratory birds (or their eggs or nests).
- 31. to offer for sale the pelt or skin from a furbearing animal taken under a hunting licence in a prescribed open season unless a royalty on the pelt or skin has been paid to the Province. (NOTE: See Royalty Fees section on page 84).
- 32. to traffic in wildlife meat or offer to do so except as authorized by permit.
- 33. to kill wildlife (with the exception of grizzly bears and furbearers other than black bear) and fail to remove the edible portions of the carcass to a place of consumption or to a cold storage locker or a meat cutting plant. BC Environment regards "a place of consumption" as a person's permanent residence and not a hunting camp or other type of temporary camp. Of grizzly bear, the hide must be removed to a residence, a cold storage locker or a taxidermist. Effective immediately, the meat of the four quarters and the loins of deer, moose, elk, mountain sheep, mountain goat, caribou, cougar and black bear, are considered the "edible
- to place bait for the purpose of attracting a migratory game bird, except under permit, or to hunt a migratory game bird within 402 metres (1/4 mile) of any baited area.

- to use live birds as decoys or recorded bird calls to hunt game birds.
- to discharge, dump, discard or dispose of litter.
- to shoot at or capture any hawk, falcon, owl or eagle.
- 38. to deface any notice posted under authority of the Wildlife Act.
- to damage or interfere with a lawfully set trap.
- to act as, or offer to act as, a guide for fish or game for compensation or reward unless licenced to do so.
- to hunt black bear or grizzly bear by placing bait or using dead wildlife or parts of it as bait.
- to possess or transport a big game animal that was killed unintentionally by accident or collision, or was illegally killed.
- to unintentionally kill a big game animal and fail to report promptly the kill to a Conservation Officer.
- 44. to possess, traffic in, import or export bear galls or genitalia separate from the carcass or hide; or traffic in, import or export bear paws separate from the carcass or hide.

LICENCE REQUIREMENTS

Anyone wishing to hunt or carry firearms in B.C. must obtain the required licence. To be eligible to obtain a resident hunting licence, a person must make his home in British Columbia and be present in the Province for six months in the 12 months immediately before applying for the licence. A member of the R.C.M.P. or Canadian Armed Services enrolled in continuing full-time military service is eligible to obtain a resident hunting licence after making his home in British Columbia for 30 days immediately before applying for the licence.

A B.C. resident 14 years of age or older must produce a B.C. Resident Hunter Number Card to purchase a Resident Hunting Licence.

 A Hunter Number Card may be obtained by the successful completion of the C.O.R.E. (Conservation and Outdoor Recreation Education) safe firearms handling test and written examination or other North American government sponsored hunter safety training program completed while resident in that state or province.

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- A Hunter Number Card can also be obtained by an applicant who produces a document issued by a province or state showing that the person has previously held a resident hunting licence legally issued to the person in British Columbia or another province of Canada or a state of the United States on or after their 10th birthday.
- 3. A person 14 years of age and under 19 must apply for a hunting licence in person in the presence of a parent or guardian, who must sign an "Acknowledgement of Responsibility" for his/her son, daughter or ward. Hunters under the age of 19 must be accompanied and closely supervised while hunting by a person who is 19 years of age or older and who holds a hunting licence.

No one under the age of 10 may hunt or carry a firearm.

When a B.C. resident 10, 11, 12, 13 or older completes C.O.R.E., he or she is entitled to a B.C. Resident Hunter Number Card, a bag limit, to purchase a hunting licence and to enter the limited entry hunting draw.

A Junior Hunting Licence can only be issued to a parent or guardian on behalf of his/her child or ward who is 10 years of age or older and under the age of 14. The junior hunter need not have completed a hunter training program but must be accompanied and supervised by a licensed adult. Wildlife taken by the junior under this licence is included in the bag limit of the accompanying licensed adult. No species licences may be purchased with the junior licence. However, during a hunting season, a licensed junior hunter may accompany and hunt with an adult holding a valid Limited Entry Hunting authorization and a valid species licence.

 Non-residents' qualifications for a Junior Hunting Licence are the same as in (4.) with the exception that they may not hunt for a species for which a Limited Entry Hunting authorization has been issued to the accompanying adult.

Indians as defined under the Indian Act (Canada) who are residents of British Columbia are not required to obtain any type of hunting licence. Indians however are not exempt from the requirements of Compulsory Reporting/Inspection nor are they exempt from the requirements of the Limited Entry Hunting regulations.

FIREARMS ACQUISITION CERTIFICATE

All persons (except a juvenile accompanied by a licenced adult) are required to obtain a Firearms Acquisition Certificate before taking possession of a gun whether they plan to buy, borrow or trade to obtain it. Application forms are available at firearms dealers or from local police. For further information, consult the Criminal Code or local police.

BOWHUNTERS

Bowhunters are asked to ensure that the box on their resident hunting licence counter-





foil, indicating that they are bowhunters, is filled in at the time of issue.

MIGRATORY BIRDS

When hunting or transporting migratory game birds, you must carry with you a valid Canadian Migratory Game Bird hunting permit in addition to any required provincial hunting licence. The permit is available at the Post Office.

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LICENCE AVAILABILITY

Resident hunting licences are available at all Government Agents' offices, some BC Environment Offices and many sporting goods stores. Non-resident hunting licences are only available from some Regional BC Environment Offices, Government Agents, and Wildlife Branch, 3rd Floor - 780 Blanshard Street, Victoria, B.C. V8V 1X4, upon completion of an application form. Non-residents may also obtain their licences by mail. To obtain a copy of the latest Hunting and Trapping Regulations Synopsis, Guide Outfitters in British Columbia booklet, and general tourism information, please write to: Ministry of Tourism, 1117 Wharf Street, Victoria, British Columbia, V8V 1X4.

Duplicates for misplaced, lost, stolen or accidentally destroyed licences are only available from Government Agents' offices for a fee of \$10.00 for the declaration of lost licence, plus a duplicate licence fee. DO NOT purchase another original licence from a sporting goods store or similar non-government licence issuer, as this will automatically show on our records that you have been issued more than the legal limit of current licences which is an offence under Wildlife Act regulations.



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ACCESS MANAGEMENT FOR WILDLIFE

Several laws govern public access to wildlife and several types of closures specifically limit access by licenced hunters or others. In brief the following laws apply:

- Trespass Act The provincial Trespass Act sets out strict limits on any public access to enclosed private land. Private property is considered enclosed if any one of the following conditions are met:
 - there are clearly visible signs prohibiting trespassing posted at each ordinary access point; or
 - the property is surrounded by a lawful fence; or
 - the property is surrounded by a natural boundary such as a river bank or a 4 1/2 foot hedge.
- Wildlife Act (Section 40) A person is not permitted to hunt on cultivated land or on Crown land which is subject to a grazing lease while the land is occupied by livestock, without the consent of the owners, lessee or occupant of the land.

In the Fraser Valley, and to a lesser extent elsewhere in agricultural areas, local sporting groups (clubs) have made private arrangements with landowners to exclude other hunters. Such areas are frequently posted to no trespassing by these sporting groups.

In addition to the above there is authority under provisions of the *Wildlife Act* to limit access by hunters or other persons.

- A) Road Closure (Section 111(b.1), B.C. Wildlife Act) BC Environment may choose to restrict the use of any vehicle on a given road surface for the protection and/or management of wildlife resources.
- B) Vehicular Hunting Closure(Section 110), B.C. Wildlife Act) -BC Environment may prohibit the use of a motorized vehicle for the purpose of hunting in a defined area for the management and/or protection of wildlife resources.
- C) Area Closure (Section 111(b), B.C. Wildlife Act) - BC Environment may close or restrict the use of any vehicle over a defined area for the protection and/or management of wildlife resources.

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PARKS RESTRICTIONS

National Parks

Hunting is prohibited in all National Parks. The law requires that all firearms transported in National Parks be dismantled, carried in a closed case or wrapped and tied securely in such a manner as not to expose any part of the firearm.

Firearms are also not permitted outside of a vehicle, vessel or aircraft in a National Park unless they are being moved into, or out of, a person's premises, or with a permit issued by the park superintendent.

Provincial Parks and Recreation Areas

Hunting or the discharge of firearms, bows or crossbows is prohibited in the majority of Provincial Parks or Recreation Areas. Only those parks and recreation areas listed in the following regional schedules are open to hunting and/or the discharge of firearms, and only during the legal hunting season as described in the schedules.

When a park or recreation area is closed to hunting or there is no open season for any species, both the possession and discharge of the firearm, bow or crossbow are prohibited except when authorized by a park officer, or except when the such weapons are carried within a vehicle.

The use of horses, motor vehicles, motorcycles, snowmobiles, other self-propelled vehicles or cycles is generally prohibited in parks and Recreation Areas except where specifically authorized. All motor vehicles on park roads must be licenced. Use of aircraft to arrive at or depart from some parks is restricted.

It is prohibited to hunt or discharge a firearm, bow or crossbow in a Provincial Park or Recreation Area within 400 metres of either side of the centre line of any park road or highway except as authorized by a park officer, unless otherwise stated in the Hunting Regulations Synopsis for a specific road. Contact any district office of BC Parks for further information, or consult Schedule A of the Park and Recreation Regulations.

Individuals hunting in a Provincial Park or Recreation Area should be aware that the *Park Act* and Park Regulations apply.

Ecological Reserves

Hunting, trapping and fishing are prohibited in Ecological Reserves in British Columbia. The possession or discharge of a firearm, bow or crossbow is prohibited. A complete list of Ecological Reserves including detailed maps and legal descriptions is available from any regional office of BC Parks, or from Parks headquarters at 800 Johnston Street, Victoria, B.C. V8V 1X4.



MUNICIPALITIES

Most municipalities have local bylaws restricting and controlling the use of firearms within their boundaries. Consult municipal clerks for details of closures. BC Environment publishes the Fraser Valley Special Area brochure which depicts provincial and municipal firearms regulations in the Fraser Valley.

OPEN SEASONS

For the purpose of defining the open seasons for big game, small game and game birds, the province is divided into Management Units (MUs) under B.C. Regulation 415/75. The open seasons for the hunting of each species of game are shown in regional schedules on the following pages. All dates mentioned therein are inclusive.

THERE IS NO OPEN SEASON ON ANY WILDLIFE UNLESS INDICATED.

Where open seasons do not apply to the entire Management Unit, reference is given to detailed maps showing the area and describing the pertinent regulations. The open sea-

sons declared by these regulations shall cease to be in effect in any area covered by a closure order issued by the Forest Service of the Ministry of Forests and shall continue to ineffective during the period covered by such forest closure order. Dates for hunting seasons may be changed by order of the Minister only in unusual circumstances. Such changes will be given local publicity.

NOTICE TO HUNTERS

Under the Wildlife Act, all wildlife, dead or alive, is owned by the provincial Crown except where a person lawfully kills the wildlife and complies with all provisions of the Wildlife Act regulations.

It is the hunter's responsibility to take only animals which meet the legal requirements. If you have any doubts about the legality of the animal, DO NOT SHOOT!

LIMITED ENTRY HUNTING

In the following pages the (E) symbol is a caution to hunters that Limited Entry Hunting restrictions may apply to all or part of the indicated management units.

Limited Entry Hunting seasons are open only to hunters who have drawn the appropriate Limited Entry authorization. Limited Entry Hunting seasons and general open seasons may coincide for some species in some management units if; a) the class of animal (sex, age, etc.) is different, or b) a portion of the management unit is available for LEH only.

Area maps showing LEH zones for seasons that coincide with general open seasons are included in the publication for reference. Hunters should refer to the 1994-95 Limited Entry Hunting Synopsis for specific LEH maps.

B.C.'s BEAR PARTS TRADE BAN

To protect grizzly and black bears, the B.C. government has imposed a ban on the commercial trade in certain bear parts effective February 1, 1993. The new regulation forbids the possession, trafficking, importing and exporting of bear galls and genitalia separated from the carcass or hide. It also bans trade in bear paws separated from the carcass or hide, although possession is still permitted to allow for personal use and for ceremonial use by aboriginal people.



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Why the ban has been imposed

Growing demand for bear parts used in traditional Asian medicine, and its potential effect on bear populations, has been of concern to the government for some time:

In May 1990, the Wildlife Branch enacted regulations to track the movement of bear parts from source to retailer or exporter. The regulations made it illegal to kill bears only for their parts. Since then, the branch has determined that such illegal kills are on the rise.

The reason for this can be traced to the extensive trade in bear parts in Asia. Bears in China, and in North and South Korea, are being farmed for their parts, thereby boosting demand. As demand increases, so does the price - documentation of international trade shows that some bear parts now sell for thousands of dollars per kilogram. If this escalation is allowed to go unchecked, it is only a matter of time before many more bear populations all over the world become seriously threatened, as some already are.

B.C.'s ban on the trade in bear parts represents an important step toward discouraging the illegal slaughter of these animals. Many jurisdictions in western North America have similar bans in place.

ABORIGINAL HUNTING

A priority of the Ministry of Environment. Lands and Parks is to ensure the longterm conservation of wildlife populations and their habitats. The Ministry also recognizes a duty to provide the aboriginal people of the province some priority, after conservation needs are met, in the use of wildlife for sustenance (food, societal and ceremonial purposes). Any uses of wildlife must be sustainable, and harvesting methods must not jeopardize safety or property. Any hunting for sale or barter of wildlife species, in whole or in part, is not sanctioned, except as authorized by regulation or specific provision in a treaty.

PROVINCE-WIDE BAN ON LEAD SHOT FOR WATERFOWL HUNTING SLATED FOR 1995/96 SEASON

The Ministry of Environment, Lands and Parks (Wildlife Branch) and Environment Canada (Canadian Wildlife Service), have proposed to ban the use of lead shot for waterfowl hunting in British Columbia by the 1995/96 season. Some additional area

closures may be necessary before then, if ongoing research shows the need.

In 1986, the Royal Society of Canada's Commission on Lead in the Environment termed lead a "powerful toxin". Concerns over organic sources of lead brought restrictions on lead content in gasoline in Canada beginning in 1974. By 1989 legislation to virtually eliminate this source was completed. In addition, reductions have been placed on particulate lead sources near mines and in household paints, and lead is no longer used for pipes in household plumbing or municipal projects.

Inorganic sources of lead, such as lead shot, are largely inert unless they come in contact with an acidic environment. In the stomachs of waterfowl and raptors ingested lead becomes extremely toxic. Incidental mortality of waterfowl caused by ingestion of lead shot pellets has been known for over a century, but over the past 35 years, concern has risen that ingested lead shot could be threatening waterfowl and bald eagle populations.

In response to this concern, and with non-toxic alternatives now available, many jurisdictions have introduced legislation to ban lead shot for use in waterfowl hunting. A complete ban now exists for the entire United

States, including Alaska. Bans in varying form and degree are in effect in Denmark, Netherlands, Norway and Australia. Other European and Asian countries are at the point of deciding what action to take, or gathering information on the magnitude of the problem. Some

local areas in the U.S. have banned lead shot for all recreational uses, and some European countries where it is already banned for waterfowl hunting have introduced surtaxes on lead shot used for other purposes.

Until now, British Columbia and the rest

of Canada have followed a "hot spot" approach, only banning lead shot where there was sufficient evidence of lead poisoning in waterfowl to warrant a ban. Initial efforts were directed at gizzard analysis, but lead shot dissolves rapidly in gizzards and may not

Remember: **DO NOT** confront a suspected violator. You cannot make a "Citizen's Arrest" or seize private property as evidence. Only a Conservation Officer or a constable is legally authorized to do this.

Instead:

Familiarize yourself with current regulations. Some common violations are;

- 1. Killing game during a closed season.
- 2. Killing female or young animals during a male only season.
- 3. Exceeding the daily bag limit.
- Property damage (shooting powerline insulators, road signs, industrial equipment).
- 5. Night hunting or pitlamping.

· RECORD

Carry a pencil and record your observations in note form as soon as you can. Photographs provide an extremely useful addition to these observations if they can be taken without alarming the violator. Take note of any features that will be of use to the enforcement officer in his investigation. These include;

- 1. Time, date, location and weather conditions.
- 2. Identification or accurate description (size, clothing, hair colour, etc.) of the violator and his companions.
- 3. Vehicle licence and description.
- 4. Evidence at the scene (head or viscera of animal, empty cartridges, etc.).
- 5. Action of the violator(s) (number of shots, etc.).

· REPORT

Report as soon as possible to the nearest Conservation Officer, R.C.M. Police or the Department of Fisheries and Oceans or dial:

to report fish, wildlife and environmental offences other than those involving salmon.

Your complaint will be registered and directed to the appropriate action centre. (In areas where there is no toll charge to call Vancouver, just dial 53-9453). The longer you wait, the more difficult it will be to investigate the violation.

Always give your name, address and phone number to verify that your intentions are serious.

OBSERVE, RECORD and REPORT has been developed in cooperation with the B.C. Wildlife Federation. The B.C.W.F. pays rewards up to \$2000 for information leading to the conviction of persons doing wanton damage to wildlife, wildlife habitat of the property of companies or individuals who allow hunters or anglers access to property they control.



be evident in birds that have, in fact, been poisoned. Lead levels in blood are more accurate determinants of lead poisoning, and are now being used to a greater extent. Recent bone lead levels in wings collected from ducks in British Columbia have shown the problem to be much more extensive than initially thought. Many areas in the Kootenays, South and Central Interior, and along the Southern Coast, show high levels of lead contamination - more than 10 parts per million in over 10% of the ducks checked. Records of wintering trumpeter swans dying from lead poisoning have been increasing as well.

In addition, a recent study indicated the first evidence of secondary poisoning in bald eagles in British Columbia. Eagles feeding on crippled waterfowl ingest lead shot from the muscle tissue of their prey. Lead contaminated eagles have been recorded from most areas of coastal British Columbia, as well as some interior locations.

At present we have no records of lead poisoning in the northern areas of the province, but no duck wings have been analyzed yet from these areas.

As managers of wildlife and champions of conservation we must do everything reasonable to reduce the unnecessary loss of wildlife attributable to poisoning from lead shot. In the United States, prior to the introduction of shot restrictions, 1.5 to 3 million waterfowl were estimated to die each year from lead poisoning. In some areas of North America as high as 30% of local duck populations have been affected.

HABITAT CONSERVATION FUND



Steel shot is currently the only alternative to lead shot that is widely available, though bismuth may be in the near future. Recent studies have shown that almost all concerns regarding gun barrel damage from steel are unsubstantiated, or can be mitigated by changing chokes. Concerns about increased crippling loss are also unfounded. Potential problems with steel shot can be overcome through practice, and the sharpening of shooting skills to adapt to the different ballistic properties of steel.

Along with CWS, we will be promoting and advertising this change as widely and as quickly as possible. The two years notice being given will afford retailers sufficient time to adjust their shotshell stocks, and allow for continued hunter education programs. Attempts will be made to get the highly regarded Cooperative Non-toxic Shot Education Program (CONSEP) seminars to as many jurisdictions as possible in the next few years.

We know that hunters will see and accept the need to change to non-toxic shot, and will respond positively, as they have in the past whenever valid conservation issues have required their support. Many other segments of society have already removed lead from their products; now hunters can assist efforts to keep this toxic substance from harming our wildlife. One thing is sure: every bird that dies from lead poisoning in the winter is one less bird to nest in the spring, and that means fewer waterfowl for hunters and everyone else to enjoy.

What is "Vegetation Management"?—this category encompasses projects where vegetation is managed to enhance food or cover for wildlife. A variety of techniques can be used: mechanical treatment, slashing, thinning, spacing, planting, avalanche control, managed grazing, and weed control. An example of this type of project is this year's reseeding and fertilizing of old fields, marsh rehabilitation, wildlife hazard fence removal, and knapweed control in the East Kootenays to enhance habitat for elk, whitetail deer and waterfowl.

\$3.1 million for fish & wildlife this year - 57 wildlife enhancement projects have been approved for a total of \$1.3 million. Some of the activities include:

- prescribed fires near Ft. St. John, Chetwynd and Dawson Creek to improve mule deer, moose, elk and Rocky Mountain Bighorn and California Bighorn Sheep habitat and winter range.
- black bear study in the Nimpkish valley to determine denning requirements and to aid in the development of integrated management guidelines.
- grizzly study in Tweedsmuir/Atnarko area to determine habitat use and population.

The Canadian Firearms Safety Course.

Sign up for safety's sake.

Nearly 1,400 people are killed by firearms every year in Canada in homicides, suicides or accidents. About the same number are wounded by firearms. Research shows that many of these deaths and injuries might have been prevented by safer handling, storage and transportation practices, topics that the Cadian Firearms Safety Course covers in detail.

Canada's firearms control law requires hat anyone applying for a Firearms Acquisition Certificate or renewal must first pass the approved test on the safe use, handling and laws relating to firearms. Successful completion of the test is valid for life except in cases where a person is prohibed from possessing a firearm. While not mandator it is recommended that all applicants complete the Canadian Firearms Safety Course before taking the test.

Course instructors and examiners are trained and certified through the Chief Provincial or Territorial Firearms Officer. Only test results from certified instructors and examiners are valid for FAC purposes. The Canadian Firearms Safety Course *Student's Handbook* is available for purchase or may be borrowed from most public libraries.

Lessons in safety

The Canadian Firearms Safety Course was developed and approved by the federal, provincial and territorial governments in collaboration with hunter safety and firearms experts from the provinces and territories. It is a comprehensive entry level course covering all aspects of safe and responsible firearms ownership and use. It is not meant to teach marksmanship and shooting accuracy.

The Canadian Firearms Safety Course provides instruction and demonstrations, video presentations and practical exercises on:

 The various types of firearms, ammunition and how they work



- · Safe handling and carrying skills
- · Safe loading and unloading techniques
- Safe field and range practices
- Safe firing positions
- · Safe storage, display and transportation methods
- The legal and social responsibilities of firearms owners
 The full course takes about 12 hours and can be given in one or more sessions depending on the group and location.

Check with your firearms officer or police department for information on the Canadian Firearms Safety Course availability in your area... and sign up for safety's sake. In the meantime, make sure you store your firearms unloaded in a secure place to prevent tragedies.



MAJOR REGULATION CHANGES

- Firearms It is unlawful to hunt with a firearm using, or containing, a single
 projectile in the breech or magazine in the former "Shotgun with Shot Only"
 areas on Maps A13, A14, A20 and A21.
- · Canada geese there is a new split season in MU 1-4.
- Deer the antierless deer season in MU 1-5 is restricted to persons under the age of 19 years on a trial basis.
- Hunting is prohibited in the following provincial parks: Chemainus River, Koksilah River, Morton Lake, and Mount Maxwell.
- · Hunting is restricted to waterfowl only in four parks.

BAG LIMITS

Deer: The bag limit for mule (black-tailed) deer is three, one of which may be antlerless, in MU I-1, I-5, and I-10, and in the Courtenay-Campbell River Special Area in MU I-6 (See Map A21). The bag limit for buck mule (black-tailed) deer is three in MUs I-2 to I-4, I-6 and I-11. The bag limit for buck mule (black-tailed) deer is two in MUs I-7 to I-9, I-12 to I-15. The bag limit for black-tailed deer and fallow deer on Sidney Island is 3 in aggregate, of which 3 may be antlerless.

Grouse: The daily aggregate bag limit for blue, spruce (Franklin) and ruffed grouse is 10.

COMPULSORY REPORTING

It is mandatory for all mountain goat, grizzly bear, cougar, bobcat, lynx, wolverine and all wolf taken in MUs 1-1 to 1-13 to be inspected. See Compulsory Reporting section on page 77.

NOTICE TO HUNTERS

- Convention on International Trade-Export (CITES) permits will be issued for grizzly bear, black bear, cougar, lynx, bobcat and wolf. See Convention on International Trade section on page 77.
- The prohibition on hunting and discharge of a firearm near buildings (page 78) is extended to Regional District Parks in Region 1.
- The use of riffes for hunting is prohibited in MU 1-1 except on Valdes Island, Sidney Island (outside the exterior boundaries of Sidney Spit Marine Park, and above the high water mark), and except by permit elsewhere.
- No hunting or shooting of upland game birds (grouse, pheasant, quail) on Denman Island. (situate in MU 1-6).

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- Qualicum National Wildlife Area (situate in MU 1-6) - Hunting, trapping, fishing and the possession of any firearm (Canada Wildlife Act) are prohibited in this area. For further details contact the Canadian Wildlife Service office in Delta (Phone: 946-8546)
- The Vancouver Island marmot is protected and should not be disturbed in its natural habitat. In order to protect the habitat for the Vancouver Island marmots, motor vehicles are prohibited in Block 1392 of MU 1-5 on Green Mountain.
- Nanaimo/Qualicum Bays (situate in MUs 1-5 and 1-6) - Waterfowl hunters will be required to obey special access restrictions while hunting in these areas. Additional enforcement will be carried out by the Conservation Officer Service during the open season.
- There is a cougar study underway in the Englishman River and Nanaimo River watersheds, Hunters are requested to avoid shooting collared cougars. See Collared Wildlife section on page 75.
- The use of raptors for hunting is permitted in Vancouver Island Region during all bow and arrow seasons. Licenced falconers may hunt waterfowl, pheasant and quail on the Saanich Peninsula during the regular open seasons for MU 1-1. See Map A1.
- On Sidney Island the open season for antlered and antierless mule (black-tailed) deer and fallow deer is August 27 to December 11. The bag limit is 3(3). Hunters must obtain permission from landowners before hunting on private land on Sidney Island.
- Deer hunting is prohibited within the exterior boundaries of Sidney Spit Marine Park. (situate in MU 1-1)
- The discharge of a firearm using a single projectile is prohibited within the exterior boundaries of Sidney Spit Marine Park, and between the mean high water mark and the mean low water mark of Sidney Island.
- The discharge of firearms is prohibited within 25 metres on either side of the midline of Westcan Terminals Road east of Indian Reserve #9 and 25 m seaward from, and including the paved area of Westcan Terminals Port site (situate in MU 1-4).
- No shooting areas: Hunters should note the Highway No Shooting and No Hunting

Areas as outlined on page 78.

Gulf Islands Special Licence Hunting Area; All persons hunting on an island in MU 1-1 (except Vancouver Island) are required to purchase a Gulf Islands Special Licence. Evidence of \$100,000 Public Liability and Property Damage insurance valid while in the field for the regular hunting season will be required. The Gulf Islands are largely comprised of private lands. Hunters are reminded that they must obtain consent from owners before hunting on private land.

PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS

In keeping with Section 29 of the Park and Recreation Area Regulations, the following Parks and Recreation Areas are only open to the discharge of firearms, bows and crossbows from September 10 to June 15 during a lawful game hunting season:

Brooks Recreation Area (MU 1-12) Cape Scott Park (waterfowl only) (MU 1-13) Gibson Marine Park (waterfowl only) (shot-

guns only) (MU 1-8)






Map B11 Sechelt No Shooting Area and Shotguns with Shot Only Area (situate in MU 2-5).




Map C2 Boston Bar No Shooting Area (situate in MU 3-14).










Map C8 Salmon Arm No Shooting or Hunting Area (situate in MU 3-26).







COMPULSORY REPORTING

VEHICLE RESTRICTIONS





ROAD AND VEHICLE RESTRICTIONS and NO SHOOTING AREAS

Information signs are posted at the points of closure for most road and vehicle restrictions. These signs are for the benefit of hunters but it is the hunters' responsibility to recognize closures whether a sign is in place or not.

Motor Vehicle Restricted Roads and Areas

The operation of all motor vehicles for

the purpose of hunting, to transport wildlife, to transport equipment and supplies which are intended for or in support of hunting or to transport hunters to and from the location of wildlife is prohibited on these roads. In areas where it is specially noted, the motor vehicle restriction applies to all persons at all times and not just hunters.

Unlicenced Motor Vehicle Restricted Areas

The operation of unlicenced motor vehicles (including ATVs) for the purpose of hunting, to transport wildlife or to transport a hunter to or from the location of wildlife is prohibited in these areas.

ATV Restricted Areas

The operation of snowmobiles or ATVs (including motorcycles) at any time is prohibited in these areas.

One Quarter Mile Single Projectile Prohibition

Single projectiles prohibited within 400 metres on either side of the road allowance. Only shotguns with shot permitted.

The discharge of firearms is prohibited in these areas.

SNOWMOBILE AND SNOW VEHICLE RESTRICTIONS

The use of snowmobiles to hunt wildlife is prohibited in MUs 6-4, 6-5, 6-6, 6-8, 6-9, 6-15 and 6-30, except as authorized by permit by BC Environment.

The use of snowmobiles for the purpose of transporting wildlife or to transport a hunter to or from the location of wildlife is prohibited in MUs 6-4, 6-5, 6-6, 6-8, 6-9, 6-15 and 6-30, from April 1 to Dec 15.

COMPULSORY REPORTING

It is mandatory for all mountain sheep, mountain goat, grizzly bear, cougar, caribou, bobcat, lynx and wolverine to be inspected. See Compulsory Reporting section on page 77 for designated reporting centres and those portions of an animal which are required.

NOTICE TO HUNTERS

- No Shooting Areas: Hunters should note the Highway No Shooting and No Hunting Areas as outlined on page 78.
- The hunting of big game (see definition) is prohibited within 400 m (1/4 mile) of either side of the centreline of the following roads:
 - Equity Mine Road southerly and easterly from Houston to the Equity Mine site (MU 6-9); and
- Topley Babine Lake Road northerly from Topley to Babine Lake at Topley Landing (MU 6-8).
- Hunting, trapping and the discharge of firearms is prohibited within Gwaii Haanas National Park Reserve (MU 6-12).
- The hunting of all wildlife is prohibited within 2 km of either side of the Muddy Lake/Golden Bear Access Road (MUs 6-22, 6-26).
- White (Kermode) and blue (Glacier) colour phases of the black bear are closed to

- hunting throughout the Skeena Region. Note that these animals are rarely pure in colour, and are usually somewhat dirty. Hunters should pass up any very lightcoloured black bear.
- Hunters should take note of the NO HUNT-ING AREA in the vicinity of Sewell near Port Clements on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Contact BC Environment for further details.
- Convention on International Trade-Export permits will be issued for black bear, grizzly bear, cougar, lynx, bobcat and wolf. See Convention on International Trade section on page 77.
- Lucy Island (in the vicinity of Langara Island, Queen Charlotte Islands) is a Wildlife Sanctuary and hunting, trapping and the discharge of firearms are prohibited (MU 6-13).
- Please avoid shooting collared caribou or grizzly bear. See Collared Wildlife Section on page 75.

USE RESPECT PROGRAM

The USE RESPECT program is unique to the Peace area of the province. This program is designed to reduce trespass problems and improve land user-landowner relations. There are approximately 750-800 landowners on this program at the present time. USE RESPECT signs are posted throughout the Peace and they make it easy for the landowner to tell the public that they can use his or her land under certain conditions. The signs indicate if access is permitted without permission, access is permitted with permission, and vehicle access is permitted

with permission. In the case of vehicle access without permission, the "designated route" system is used. Each orange (permission needed) or green (no permission required) sign also has the landowner's name, location and telephone number on it. This will make it easier for potential land users to contact landowners. Dash cards will also be issued by landowners to those persons who have permission for access in those areas where permission is required.

Consult the BC Environment offices in Fort St. John, Dawson Creek or Chetwynd for further details. REMEMBER THAT ACCESS TO PRIVATE PROPERTY IS A PRIVILEGE. DON'T ABUSE IT.



MAJOR REGULATION CHANGES

- The Okanagan Landing "No Shooting and Hunting" area has been removed. This area has been annexed by the City of Vernon. Municipal regulations prohibiting discharge of firearms will be in force.

BAG LIMITS

Deer: The bag limit for deer is two, only one of which may be a mule (black-tailed) deer. Both deer may be antlerless, but only one antlerless deer of each species may be taken. Antlerless deer may only be taken in Bow and Arrow Only or LEH seasons.

Mountain Sheep: A person who kills a male mountain sheep greater than one year of age in the Okanagan Sub-Region since January 1, 1990, may not hunt or kill another male mountain sheep greater than one year of age during the 1994/95 season.

Grouse: The daily aggregate bag limit for grouse (blue, spruce (Franklin), and ruffed) is five (5).

Elk: The bag limit for elk is one (1).

COMPULSORY REPORTING

It is mandatory for all elk, mountain sheep, mountain goat, grizzly bear, cougar, caribou, bobcat, lynx and wolverine to be inspected.





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See Compulsory Reporting section on page 77 for designated reporting centres and those portions of an animal which are required.

SNOWMOBILE RESTRICTIONS

The use of snowmobiles to hunt wildlife, transport wildlife or transport hunters to or from the location of wildlife is prohibited in the Okanagan Sub-region from April 1 to November 30.

VEHICLE RESTRICTIONS

- The operation of all motor vehicles is prohibited from June 1 to October 31 in the Galloping Hills Area except for the primary roads leading to Lightning Peak and Mt. Scaia. See Map H13.
- The operation of all motor vehicles for the purpose of hunting, to transport wildlife or to transport hunters to or from the location of wildlife is prohibited in that portion of MU 8-5 on the Lawless-Jacobson Lake Forest Service Road (Project 5104-05) south of the point where it crosses Vuich Creek.
- The operation of motor vehicles is restricted to established roadways in the Osoyoos Oxbows motor vehicle restricted area. See Map H1.
- The operation of all motor vehicles is prohibited within the Underdown Creek area of MU 8-1. See Map H2.
- The operation of all motor vehicles is prohibited in that portion of MU 8-9 described as Lot A and Lot B of Sublot 48, District Lot 2710, Plan 27801, SDYD, and Sublot 48, District Lot 2710, Plan 1189, SDYD.






Map H2 Underdown Creek Vehicle Restricted Area (situate in MU 8-1). Closed year-round to the operation of all motor vehicles.










Map H8 Naramata No Shooting Area and Shotguns with shot only (situate in MU 8-9).




Map H9 Jewel Lake No Shooting and No Hunting Area (situate in MU 8-14).







HUNTING GENERAL INFORMATION

SECTION C

DEFINITIONS

ALL TERRAIN VEHICLE - Means a wheeled vehicle or tracked vehicle propelled by motorized power, and capable of travel off a highway, including motor cycles but not including other vehicles licenced for highway travel under the Motor Vehicle Act.

ANTLERED ANIMAL - means a member of the deer family over one year of age bearing visible bony antlers.

ANTLERLESS ANIMAL - means a member of the deer family or young animals of the deer family bearing no visible antlers. The small skin- or hair-covered protuberances of fawns and calves do not constitute antlers.

ARROW - means a slender shaft, which may be pointed at one end and may be feathered at the opposite end, for shooting from a bow.

BAIT - means anything, including meat, cereals, cultivated crops, restrained animal or any manufactured product or material, that may attract wild-life and includes plastic or other imitation foods but does not include a decoy as described under these regulations.

B.C. RESIDENT - means a person who maintains

a permanent home in the Province, and who has been in actual residence therein for six (6) months in the previous twelve (12) months prior to any application under the *Wildlife Act*.

BIG GAME - means any mountain sheep, mountain goat, caribou, elk, moose, deer, grizzly bear, black bear, cougar, wolf or other animal designated by regulation.

BOLT - means a shaft or missile designed to be shot from a crossbow or catapult.

BOW - means a longbow or crossbow.

BROW TINE - means the first tine projecting forward or upward in the lower 1/3 of the antler of a moose, caribou, elk or deer.

BUCK OR BULL - with reference to deer, moose, or elk means one bearing visible bony antlers. Buck or Bull - with reference to Caribou means a male 1 year of age or over, bearing visible bony antlers.

CALF - means a moose, elk or caribou less than twelve (12) months of age.

CANCELLED SPECIES LICENCE - means a Species Licence that has been cancelled as indicated on the licence. The Species Licence must be cancelled immediately upon killing the animal.

COMPOUND CROSSBOW - means a crossbow on which the bow string runs through pulleys.

CROSSBOW - means a bow fixed across a stock with a groove for the arrow or bolt and a mechanism for holding and releasing the string. (NOTE: Thouse of crossbows is permitted during special Bow and Arrow seasons unless otherwise indicated under the regional schedules.)

DECOY - means any material or manufactured product that simulates the appearance or has the form of wildlife.

DEER FAMILY - means moose, caribou, deer and elk.

FIREARM - includes a device that propels a projectile by means of an explosion, compressed gas or spring and includes a rifle, shotgun, handgun, pelletgun, "BB" gun or spring gun but does not include a bow.

FULL CURL BIGHORN RAM - means any male bighorn mountain sheep, the head of which, when viewed squarely from the side, has at least one horn tip extending upwards beyond a straight line drawn through the centre of the nostril and the lowest hindmost portion of the horn base. If the skull and horns are presented for examination, when viewed squarely from the side with both



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






Reference points (+): use centre of the nostril and the lowest hindmost portion of the base of the horn.

upward beyond a straight line drawn through the lowest hindmost portion of the horn base and the lowermost edge of the eye socket.

3/4 CURL BIGHORN RAM - means any male bighorn mountain sheep, the head of which, when viewed squarely from the side, has at least one horn tip extending beyond a straight line drawn through the back of the eye opening and at right angles to a line drawn between the centre of the nostril

opening and at right angles to a line drawn between the centre of the nostril and the lowest hindmost portion of the horn base. If the skull and horns are presented for examination, when viewed squarely from the side with both horns in alignment, at least one

Legal rams cannot be identified unless viewed squarely from the side. Horn annuli do not constitute a good field guide for aging sheep. These field definitions adequately conform to legal definitions, copies of which are available at BC Environment offices.

hom tip extends beyond a straight line through the back edge of the eye socket and at right angles to a line drawn through the lowest hindmost portion of the hom base and the lowermost edge of the eye socket.

FULL CURL THINHORN RAM - means any male thinhorn mountain sheep which has attained the age of eight (8) years as evidenced by yearly horn growth annuli as determined by the Regional Manager or his designate, or whose horn tip extends upwards beyond the forehead-nose bridge when viewed from the side.

FUR-BEARING ANIMAL - means a fox, badger, beaver, black bear, marten, fisher, Canada lynx, bobcat, mink, muskrat, land otter, raccoon, skunk, red and Douglas's squirrel, sea otter, weasel, wolverine, wolf or coyote.

GAME BIRD - means any grouse, partridge, quail, pheasant, ptarmigan, migratory game bird, or bird designated by regulation.

GAME - includes all big game, small game, game birds and fur-bearing animals.

HUNT AND HUNTING - includes shooting at, attracting, searching for, chasing, pursuing, following after or on the trail of, stalking, or lying in wait for wildlife or attempting to do any of those things, whether or not the wildlife is then or subsequently wounded, killed or captured;

- (a) with intention to capture the wildlife, or
- (b) while in possession of a firearm or other weapon.

LEGAL MATURE BULL MOOSE - (for MUs 7-35, 7-42, 7-57 and 7-58) means a bull moose having at least one antler with a brow palm bearing three or more points (tines). The brow palm is separated from the main palm by the deepest antler bay. The deepest bay is the bay whose vertex (deepest location) is the shortest distance from the antler base, when measured along the surface of the antler (see page 81).

LICENCE YEAR - means the period from April 1 to March 31 of the following year.

LOADED FIREARM - means any firearm containing live ammunition in either the breech or the magazine. A clip containing live ammunition, when attached to the firearm, is considered as the magazine.

MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS - for which there is an open season in B.C. and for which a Canadian Migratory Bird hunting permit is required are: waterfowl(ducks and geese, including brant); coot; common snipe; and mourning dove.

NO HUNTING AREA - means a designated area in which hunting (see Definition) is prohibited.

NO SHOOTING AREA - means a designated area in which the discharge of firearms is prohibited. NOTE: No Shooting Areas as prescribed under the *Wildlife Act* are open to the use of bows and arrows and crossbows unless specifically restricted under hunting regulations.

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Hunting General Information • Section C

POINT - or "tine" means a branch of an antler which is longer than the breadth of its base and is at least 2.5 cm (1 inch) in length. For the purpose of determining the length of a point;

- (a) the length of the point shall be measured from the centre of its base to the tip end, and
- (b) the base of the point shall be measured along the nearest edge of the part of the antler commonly known as the main beam.

POWER BOAT - means a boat, canoe or yacht powered by electric, gasoline, oil, steam or other mechanical means, but does not include a boat powered manually nor a boat with an outboard motor provided the motor is tilted or otherwise disengaged so as not to be ready for immediate use.

RAPTOR - means a bird of the order Falconiformes known as vultures, eagles, falcons and hawks or of the order Strigiformes known as owls and includes the eggs of these birds.

ROAD ALLOWANCE - see definition, page 78.

SMALL GAME - includes fox, raccoon, lynx, bobcat, coyote, skunk, wolverine, snowshoe hare and game birds.

SPIKE BUCK - means a male deer having antlers that are composed of a main beam from which there are no bony projections greater than 1 inch in length.

WILDLIFE - means raptors, threatened species, endangered species, game and other species of vertebrates prescribed as wildlife by regulation.

NOTICE

Hunting License Fees for the 1994-95 Season

In 1991/92, the Wildlife Branch completed a detailed review of the fees that it charges for licenses and permits. In setting new fees, the main goals were to restrict any increases to modest amounts and to adjust species license fees to reflect their relative values. The cost of hunting licenses should continue to represent a minor share of total hunting costs.

Based on this review, the fees for resident black bear and deer licenses increase from \$12 to \$15 for the 1994/95 season. The fee for a basic hunting license will increase only for senior citizens (from \$5 to \$7).

HOW LONG SHOULD I KEEP MY HUNTING LICENCE?

It is probably a good idea for hunters to keep all documents under which an animal was taken until the animal has been consumed. In the case of a mounted trophy or a tanned hide, the licence and Compulsory Inspection Data Sheet should be kept in a safe place indefinitely. If a person wishes to transfer the trophy to someone else or requires an export permit to move it out of the province, production of the original documentation makes the transfer or the issuance of a permit much easier. It will greatly assist Ministry staff, if, when a hunter disposes of a trophy, the licences and other documentation are transferred with the trophy, to the new owner.

VIOLATORS BE WARNED!

We will be tough with violators of our conservation laws and invaluable wildlife resource!

Be aware that if you are careless, or reckless, or dangerous, ignorant, or uninformed, or unsafe or greedy in other words, if you are convicted of an offence under the Wildlife Act of British Columbia or the regulations, or the Migratory Birds Convention Act (Canada), or the Criminal Code (respecting the possession or use of firearms while hunting), you may:

- have your hunting and/or firearm licence(s) cancelled for an automatic minimum period that can range from one to five years and, that, upon consideration by the Director, Wildlife Branch, may be extended to up to ten years;
- upon consideration by the Director, Wildlife Branch, for offences that do not carry an automatic licence cancellation, have your hunting/firearm licence(s) cancelled for a period of from one to ten years;

- be liable to a fine which for certain offences will range between \$200 and \$10,000, rising to between \$1,000 and \$50,000 for repeats of these offences, and for other offences to a fine of not more than \$5,000, rising to between \$500 and \$10,000 for repeats of these offences:
- be liable to a term of imprisonment of up to six months.

You should also be aware that:

- if you are convicted of an offence under the Migratory Birds Convention Act (Canada), you will have your migratory game bird permit cancelled automatically:
- if you are convicted of two wildlife or firearm offences within a period of two years, your hunting licence will be cancelled for an automatic minimum period of one year;
- if you do not pay any fine(s) imposed for wildlife offence(s), all licences, permits and limited entry hunting authorizations issued to you under the Wildlife Act will be cancelled and will remain cancelled until the fine(s) is/are paid.

BE WARNED!

KNOW THE LAW AND OBEY IT!

Hunters should be aware of the following 5 most frequent convictions:

- 1. Unlawful possession of dead wildlife.
- 2. Hunting or carrying firearms without a license.
- Failure to produce a license or permit on request.
- Failure to immediately cancel species li-
- Hunting wildlife not within an open sea-

NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT HUNTERS

BIG GAME GUIDED HUNTS

Non-residents of British Columbia hunting big game must be accompanied by a licenced B.C. guide. When purchasing big game species licences, non-residents must provide the licensing office with the name of the guide outfitter, the guide's licence number, the management unit(s) in which the hunt will take place and the dates of the hunt. On completion of the hunt non-residents must obtain a completed form of declaration from their guide. Failure to do so constitutes an offence on the part of the hunter and the guide.

Big Game Accompanied Hunts

A non-resident of B.C. who is a resident of Canada or a Canadian citizen may be accompanied by a resident of B.C. who holds a Permit to Accompany (\$25). Only one Permit to Accompany will be issued to a person in a calendar year.

The B.C. resident applying for this permit must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada who has held a hunting licence and a big game species licence for 3 of the 5 years preceding application. This person must obtain the required permit from the Regional Office of BC Environment of the region in which the hunt is intended. Application for the permit must be made on the

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
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proper form (available from BC Environment Offices) at least one month prior to hunting. Only one Permit to Accompany will be issued to a person in a calendar year.

The non-residents must show the Permit to Accompany or a copy indicating the name of the permittee and the permit number when purchasing their big game species licence. A non-resident who is not a resident of Canada and is not a Canadian citizen, may also be eligible under this procedure providing that he qualifies under one of the required relationship categories (ie. if accompanied by a father, brother, son, uncle, nephew, grandson, grandfather, mother, sister, daughter, aunt, niece, granddaughter, grandmother, spouse, father-in-law, mother-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, brother-in-law, or sister-in-law). Permits to Accompany may not be available for all species and areas. Check with the appropriate regional office.

Handguns

There are special handgun restrictions in Canada. Please contact the R.C.M.P. for details before bringing a handgun into Canada.

Small Game

It is not necessary for a non-resident of British Columbia to be accompanied by a licenced guide when hunting for small game (including game birds).

Queen Charlotte Islands Deer Licence:

These special deer tags allow hunters to exceed the deer bag limit for the Skeena Region and the 3 deer



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Deer Licence Entitlement

A person may not possess more than 10 of any current deer licences, The combination of deer licenses may include a maximum of 3 mule deer and/or 3 white-tailed deer licences.

WATERFOWL HUNTERS

Waterfowl die of lead poisoning when they ingest lead shot deposited by waterfowl hunters. Alternative non-toxic shot is available. Waterfowl hunters are encouraged to use steel shot for waterfowl hunting, especially over water. Hunters are reminded that steel shot two sizes larger, fired through a shotgun with a choke one stop more open than normally used for lead shot, will produce similar energy and pattern.

ROYALTY FEES

Every holder of a valid hunting licence who kills a

furbearing animal is exempt from paying the prescribed royalty fee unless he offers the pelt for sale. See current Trapping Regulations on page 84 for royalty fees. Payment of a royalty fee is required only upon the initial sale of the pelt. Furbearers may only be hunted where an open hunting season is declared.

SPECIAL NOTICE - GRIZZLY BEAR OR BLACK BEAR

There is no open season on any two year old or younger bear (grizzly bear or black bear) or any bear in its company. Do not shoot any grizzly bear or black bear when observed in a family unit.

There is no open season on white (Kermode) or blue (Glacier) color phases of the black bear.

If you shoot an ear-tagged black bear, contact a BC Environment Office as soon as possible for important information.

SPECIAL REQUEST - MOUNTAIN GOAT

Hunters are encouraged to select male mountain goat when hunting. Males tend to be larger than females. Females usually exhibit a noticeable curvature at the tip of the homs. In addition males tend not to be found in nanny/kid groups.

COLLARED WILDLIFE

Please avoid shooting collared moose, elk. cari-

bou, deer, mountain goat, mountain sheep, wolf, black bear, grizzly bear, bobcat and cougars. Collared animals carry radio transmitters and are used for research purposes. The death of one of these animals represents a substantial loss in terms of time and money. If a radiocollared animal is inadvertently killed, please return the collar to an office of BC Environment.

PAY HUNTING

A) Hunting Operations on Private Land

By special permit [Wildlife Act Permit Regulations 1(t)], a person or association can be authorized to carry on an operation for the purpose of hunting wildlife on property owned or controlled by that person or association. Such operations are primarily for the purpose of hunting game birds for which the hunter pays a prearranged user fee.

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B) Trespass Fee

Some private landowners charge an access fee for the right of an individual or group to trespass on the landowner's property for the purpose of hunting or for other activities. Trespass fees have been paid by individuals or local sportsmen groups to access farmland open to bird hunting in the Fraser Valley for many years, but is seldomly used elsewhere in

BAG LIMITS AND POSSESSION LIMITS

Season bag limits for big game and small game and daily bag limits for game birds are shown in the regional schedules following the date of the open season for the species.

The bag limits are printed in bold type, e.g. "2." "NBL" means No Bag Limit. An entry such as "2(1)" used for ungulates means the season bag limit is two animals of that species, one of which may be antlerless. An entry such as "10(20)" for game birds means the daily bag limit is 10 and the possession limit while hunting or returning from hunting is 20.

The following list indicates the maximum number of species which a hunter may take in the province in one licence year. Exceptions to the Provincial bag limits may apply to some species in some regions. Provincial bag limits may be achieved by hunting in one or more regions provided the regional bag limits are not exceeded.

Game Birds: No person, while in the field either actually hunting or returning from hunting, shall have in his possession upland game birds in excess of three times the daily limit.

For possession limits on migratory game birds see regional schedules.

The daily bag limit for all geese in aggregate is 5, possession 10.

The bag limit for turkey is 1 per year.

The daily bag limit for ducks in aggregate is 6, only 1 of which may be a canvasback, 1 northern pintail, 2 goldeneyes and 4 mallards. The possession limit for ducks is 12, only 2 of which may be canvasback, 2 northern pintails, 4 goldeneyes and 8 mallards.

PROTECTED ANIMALS

The following mammals are protected by regulation under the Wildlife Act (hunting is prohibited):

- 2. mountain cottontail (found in the Similkameen and Okanagan Valleys),
- 3. white-tailed jackrabbit (confined to the South Okanagan Valley).

The following species are designated as endangered in B.C. and may not be killed for any reason:

- Vancouver Island marmot,
- sea otter,
- 3. white pelican,
- 4. burrowing owl.

POSSESSION AND TRANSPORTATION

BIG GAME

Anyone who possesses or transports the carcass of big game must leave attached to the carcass:

- to identify the sex, either
- a) a testicle or part of the penis, or
- b) a portion of the udder or teats, or that portion of the head which normally bears the antlers.

Anyone who possesses or transports only the hide of grizzly bear must leave attached to the hide:

- a testicle or part of the penis, or
- a portion of the udder or teats.

GAME BIRDS

Anyone who possesses or transports a game bird must leave attached to the carcass one feathered wing.

EVIDENCE OF SEX

Evidence of sex may be removed from the carcass of game or the hide of grizzly bear:

- after it arrives at a person's normal dwelling place and is butchered and stored there for consumption on the premises.
- after it is taken to a cold storage locker or meatcutting
- after it has been inspected by an employee of BC

NOTE: Leaving evidence of sex on the carcass will not spoil or in any way contaminate the meat.

TRANSPORTING WILDLIFE

Anyone who possesses, transports or ships wildlife or parts of wildlife within the Province of British Columbia must have with them:

the species licence under which the animal was taken by himself.

Or if the animal was taken by another person:

- a record of receipt of the wildlife showing:
- the date and place of receipt.
- the name and address of the person who killed the animal, or from whom it was acquired.
- the B.C. Resident Hunter Number or permit number of the person who killed the animal.
- the species licence number under which the animal





was taken, and

- the species and sex of the animal taken.

Anyone having wildlife butchered and packaged is required to obtain from the butcher a receipt which indicates;

- · the hunter number,
- · the species licence number,
- · the species, and
- · the sex of the animal taken.

GAME CHECK

All hunters, with or without game, when encountering temporary checking stations operated by BC Environment, are required by law to stop and report. Their compliance with wildlife and firearms laws will be determined.

Comments on or questions about hunting regulations and wildlife management are encouraged.

EXPORT PERMITS

In order to export game from the Province, hunters (resident or non-resident) must obtain a permit for this purpose, unless the export permit which is valid for 30 days is included in the species licence or the compulsory inspection data sheet.

Hunters planning to hunt in MUs 7-19 or 7-20 and accessing by way of the Alberta border should contact the local Conservation Officer Service in Fort St. John, Chetwynd or Dawson Creek to obtain export permits prior to starting their hunt.

Hunters possessing a mountain goat, mountain sheep, caribou or grizzly bear harvested in B.C., who must drive through the Yukon and back into B.C. in order to submit the animal for compulsory inspection, are exempt from obtaining an export permit.

CONVENTION ON INTERNATIONAL TRADE

The "Convention on the International Trade of Endangered Species" (C.I.T.E.S.) requires that a special Convention Export Permit be obtained for the export from Canada of all grizzly bear, black bear, cougar, lynx, bobcat and wolf or parts of these animals. Such permits, for game leaving Canada directly from British Columbia, may be obtained by making an appointment during normal working hours at BC Environment offices. See page 9.

Cariboo Sub-region: Bella Coola, Williams Lake, Skeena Region: Smithers, Atlin, Burns Lake, Terrace, Dease Lake.

Omineca-Peace Sub-region: Fort Nelson, Dawson Creek, Prince George, Fort St. John.

Okanagan Sub-region: Penticton, Vernon.

PUBLIC CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE FUND

The Public Conservation Assistance Fund makes available more than \$50,000 per year for grants to clubs or other organizations wishing to implement conserva-

tion projects in their areas. Grants may be issued, in modest amounts, to cover up to one-half of the initial capital expenses of approved projects. Conservation, as defined for the purposes of this fund, includes any activity which maintains or enhances fish and wildlife and their habitats, or contributes to public access or awareness of our natural resources.

COMPULSORY REPORTING & INSPECTION

COMPULSORY REPORTING

To manage wildlife we need population, age, sex, time and site specific information. The most efficient and effective way of getting needed information at the present time is a compulsory inspection system.

The harvest of the following species of game must be reported to a regional or sub-regional compulsory reporting centre and the required parts submitted for compulsory inspection (page 78):

- bull moose taken in Thompson-Nicola Sub-region, in Cariboo Sub-region and in Okanagan Subregion and all moose taken the Kootenay Region
- 2) bull moose taken in MU 7-35
- elk taken in the Okanagan and Omineca-Peace Sub-regions.
- 4) caribou
- 5) grizzly bear
- 6) mountain sheep
- 7) mountain goat
- 8) cougar
- wolf taken in MUs 1-1 to 1-13 and the Kootenay Region
- 10) bobcat, lynx, and wolverine.

The associated tagging and registration system for all inspected hides, skulls or horns is required to facilitate verification of inspection of such animal parts in private or commercial (taxidermist) possession for enforcement purposes.

Information required for compulsory reporting neludes:

- 1. the location where the animal was killed.
- 2. the date the animal was killed.



- the number of days the licencee hunted before killing the animal,
- 4. the sex of the animal taken, and
- 5. the licences under which the animal was taken.

FOR DESIGNATED COMPULSORY INSPECTION CENTRES SEE PAGE 9

The required parts of all compulsory reported species must be submitted to an official of BC Environment within 10 days of the kill, except:

- Persons who gain the written approval from a Conservation Officer, Wildlife Biologist, Wildlife Technician or Official of BC Environment prior to hunting can submit such animals for inspection within 10 days after the last day of the hunt;
- Persons who use the services of a licenced guide for the purpose of killing a caribou, grizzly bear, mountain goat or mountain sheep can submit such animals for inspection within 10 days after the last day of the continuous season in which the animal was taken (ie. fall killed grizzly bear must be submitted after the end of the fall season); or
- Persons who take a cougar or a wolf in the Kootenay Region. These two species must be submitted to an official of BC Environment in the Kootenay Region within 4 days of the kill.



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

COMPULSORY INSPECTION Parts Required

Parts required for compulsory inspection include:

- For a bull moose taken in the Thompson-Nicola Subregion, in Cariboo Sub-region and the Okanagan Sub-region; and all moose taken in the Kootenay Region;
- an incisor tooth, (including crown and root). The tooth may be delivered in person to a BC Environment Office, or it may be mailed in a Harvest Data Card Tooth "Return" envelope, available from licence issuers, Government Agents or BC Environment offices.
- For a bull moose taken in MU 7-35:

 the antlers and an incisor tooth.
- For elk taken in the Okanagan and Omineca-Peace Sub-regions;
- the lower jaw bearing the incisor (front) teeth,
- for males, the antlers attached to a portion of the upper skull
- for females, the upper portion of the skull or a portion of the teats or mammary glands.
- 4) For caribou;
 - the lower jaw bearing the incisor teeth,
- the antlers.
- for a caribou without at least one main beam measuring over 60 centimetres (24 inches) in length, the hide or part of it bearing a testicle or part of the penis,
- 5) For grizzly bear;
- the entire hide bearing, in the case of males, a testicle or part of the penis and in the case of females, a portion of the teats or mammary glands,
- the skull with the lower jaw (preferably skinned out).
- For mountain sheep (ie. Dall's, Stone's, California and Rocky Mountain);
- the portion of the skull including nasal bones, the eye-socket, the horns and the associated connective bone structure.
- 7) For mountain goat;
 - the horns and the jaw bearing the incisor teeth.
 - For mountain goat in the Kootenay Region, compulsory reporting requirements for those hunters with an LEH authorization will be met by providing

the information and the tooth required as per instructions included with the LEH authorization by mail within 10 days of the kill

8) For cougar;

- the skull with the lower jaw (preferably skinned out).
- the premolars from the upper jaw (Vancouver Island Region and Kootenay Region only).
- the entire hide bearing, in the case of males, a testicle or part of the penis and in the case of females, a portion of the teats or mammary glands
- For wolf taken in MUs 1-1 to 1-13 and the Kootenay Region;
 - the skull with the lower jaw,
 - the hide bearing, in the case of

males, a testicle or part of the penis and in the case of females, a portion of the teats or mammary glands (Kootenay Region only).

- 11) For bobcat, lynx and wolverine;
- a canine tooth (Kootenay Region only), and
- the entire hide.

HUNTING METHODS

ARCHERY HUNTING

Bows and arrows and crossbows and bolts (quarrels) may be used for hunting all big game, small game and game birds except that a crossbow is prohibited to hunt migratory game birds. The following restrictions apply to the use of bows and crossbows province-wide. Check regional schedules for open seasons and additional restrictions.

Crossbows

- No person shall hunt big game, other than deer, with a crossbow (does not include compound crossbows) having a pull of less than 68 kg(150 lbs.) or a bolt (quarrel) weighing less than 16.2 grams(250 grains).
- No person shall hunt deer, small game, or game birds with a crossbow (does not include compound crossbows) having a pull of less than 55 kg(120 lbs.) or a bolt (quarrel) weighing less than 16.2 grams(250 grains).
- No person shall hunt wildlife with a compound crossbow having a pull of less than 45 kg(100 lbs.) at a peak weight or bolt weighing less than 16.2 grams(250 grains).
- No person shall hunt big game with a crossbow having a bolt (quarrel) other than one having a broadhead of at least 2.22 centimetres (7/8 of an inch) at the widest point.

Long Bow and Arrow

No person shall hunt big game with a long bow

having a pull of less than 18 kg(40 lbs.) within the archer's draw length and an arrow other than one having a broadhead at least 2.22 centimetres (7/8 of an inch) at the widest point.

No person shall hunt small game with a long bow having a pull of less than 18 kg(40 lbs) within the archer's draw length.

MUZZLE LOADERS

A muzzle loader containing powder and shot in the barrel but UNPRIMED (ie. no powder in the pan of a flint lock or no cap in the nipple of a percussion lock) does not constitute a loaded firearm under the Wildlife Act but is a loaded firearm under the Criminal Code of Canada.

DOGS

The use of dogs is permitted in the hunting of all game, but dogs must be on a leash when used to hunt mule deer, black-tailed deer, white-tailed deer, fallow deer, elk, moose, wolf, mountain sheep, mountain goat and caribou. Dogs may be used to hunt small game, grizzly bear, black bear or cougar. Any person may train dogs by allowing them, under supervision, to pursue game birds from August 1 to April 30.

FALCONRY

Licenced falconers may hunt game birds (migratory and upland) by the use or with the aid of raptors throughout the Province during the regular open season subject to the applicable bag limits as indicated in the regional schedules.

RETRIEVAL

It is lawful for a person to retrieve a dead or injured game animal with the assistance of a power boat provided no person in the power boat is in possession of a loaded firearm. No person shall kill, cripple or wound game without making all reasonable effort to retrieve and include it in his bag limit. The retrieved game shall be killed immediately and included in the hunter's bag limit.

HIGHWAY NO SHOOTING and NO HUNTING AREAS

It is unlawful to discharge a firearm or hunt within the road allowances of all numbered highways and any two lane or greater public road that is maintained by the Ministry of Transportation and Highways. The road allowance extends (a) 15 metres on either side of the middle of a road with less than three lanes, or (b) 15 metres from the edge of the paved surface of a highway with three lanes or more, or (c) to the boundary of private or cultivated land, whichever comes first.

In addition to the above universal restriction, several major or heavily populated routes in the province have an additional 400 m area bordering the road allowance in which the discharge of a firearm using a single projectile is prohibited. The discharge of a shotgun using shot only is permitted. These areas are listed below under the heading 400 m Single Projectile Prohibited Areas.

It is unlawful to hunt or discharge a firearm within 100 metres of a church, school building, school yard, playground, dwelling house, or farm or ranch building that is occupied by persons or domestic animals. Owners and occupiers or persons who have the permission of the owner or occupier, are exempted near dwelling houses or farm or ranch buildings, provided they are at least 100m from a neighbour's residence or buildings.

The major purpose of these restrictions attacks the





problems associated with increasing public pressure for more and more closures near rural roads, where the urban public is expanding residential properties, often at considerable distances from main urban centres. The above restrictions, although perhaps initially are more than required for some parts of the province, will be universal and, more importantly, universally understood.

It is unlikely that these changes will reduce any hunter's chances for a successful or fulfilling hunting experience. These changes will address the safety concerns that have been expressed by many residents living in previously unrestricted rural areas. We hope that common sense will prevail, and - if in doubt, don't shoot! NOTES: 1 A person who has a loaded magazine in a

motor vehicle on a highway, whether or not the magazine is attached to a firearm, commits an offence under the Criminal Code of Canada, because he/she has a "loaded magazine" in possession in an area where the discharge of a firearm is prohibited "... by federal, provincial or municipal law", i.e. within the "no-thonting area" of the highway.

2. Other closures that may be more restrictive on some highways or roads are listed below or under the Regional Schedules.

400M SINGLE PROJECTILE PROHIBITED AREAS

The discharge of a firearm using a single projectile is prohibited within 400m (0.25 mile) of either side of the road allowance of following portions of the highways and roads in British Columbia listed below:

Highway 5 (Coquihalla Highway) between Hope and the junction of Highways I and 5 at Kamloops;

Highway 6 between Bench Creek and Banting Creek:

Highway 16 between the boundary of the City of Prince Rupert and the British Columbia - Alberta interprovincial boundary;

Highway 20 between Bella Coola and the westerly boundary of Tweedsmuir Park; from the junction with Route 16 Highway 27

(Yellowhead) west of Vanderhoof to Fort St. James:

Highway 29 between the intersection of Highway 29 with Highway 97 in the vicinity of the Village of Chetwynd and the intersection of Highway 29 with Highway 97 in the vicinity of Charlie Lake, Peace River Land District:

Highway 35 between Francois Lake and Burns Lake:

Highway 37 between the intersection of highway 37 with Highway 16 and the boundary of the District of Kitimat:

Highway 37 between the Skeena River Bridge at Kitwanga Post Office, Cassiar Land District, and the intersection of said highway with Highway 37A.

at Meziadin Junction; Highway 37A between the intersection of said highway and Highway 37 at Meziadin Junction and the boundary of the District of Stewart at Bitter Creek;

Highway 39 from the junction with Highway 97 north of Mcleod Lake to its intercept with the municipal boundaries of the City of Mackenzie;

Highway 97 including those portions of the Cariboo Highway from Cottonwood River to Prince George, the John Hart Highway from Prince George to Dawson Creek, and the Alaska Highway from Dawson Creek to Lower Post:

between Hudson's Hope and the Road 520 W.A.C. Bennett Dam:

Road 190 between Road 520 and Dunlevy Creek:

400M HUNTING AND THE DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS PROHIBITED AREAS

Hunting and the discharge of firearms is prohibited within 400m (.25 mile) of the road allowance of the following highways:

Highway 3 between Hope and Manning Park, Manning Park and Princeton.

Coquihalla Hwy. (Okanagan Connector Phase III) between its junction with Highway 97 near Peachland and its junction with Highway 5 near Aspen Grove.

HIGHWAY 99 DISCHARGE OF FIRE-ARMS PROHIBITED AREA

The discharge of firearms is prohibited within 400m west of the road allowance and 1 km east of the road allowance of Highway 99 between the northern boundary of the District Municipality of West Vancouver and the southern boundary of the District Municipality of Squamish.

C.O.R.E.

C.O.R.E. is an educational program designed to ensure that prospective new hunters meet acceptable standards of knowledge and skill for safe and ethical participation in hunting.

Although not compulsory, classroom instruction in C.O.R.E. is recommended and may be obtained through courses in adult education, community colleges, rod and gun clubs or advertisements in the local media. The written examination is based on: Ethics, Firearms Safety, Regulations, First Aid and Survival, and Animal and Bird Identification. There is a \$7.00 fee for each of the written and practical examinations payable to the examiner.

To prepare at home for the C.O.R.E. exams, the course requires about 21 hours of self study and practice using the C.O.R.E. text. Information on how to obtain the C.O.R.E. text and lists of volunteer C.O.R.E. examiners are available from the offices of the Government Agent or BC Environment.

ILLEGAL GUIDING

DON'T SUPPORT ILLEGAL GUIDING

The Wildlife Act defines "guide" as; "a person who

for compensation or reward received or promised, accompanies and assists another person to hunt wildlife"

A person must possess a valid British Columbia Guide Outfitter Licence or Assistant Guide Licence in order to legally guide hunters. The government licences guides to ensure that their activities can be closely monitored and regulated.

BC Environment intends to increase its enforcement efforts to stop illegal guiding. A person who guides without the proper licence commits an offence. A person who uses the services of an illegal guide may, as a party to the offence, be charged and convicted of the same offence.

DESIGNATED WILDLIFE

All native species of animals in the province excluding invertebrates and fish have been designated as wildlife, giving them full protection under provisions of the Wildlife Act, SBC 1982, chapter 57. These species may not be hunted, killed, captured, kept as pets or used for commercial purposes unless specifically allowed by regulation or by authority of a permit from BC Environment. The accompanying two schedules list the wildlife that may be considered as nuisances or pests.

Schedule "B" lists animals that may be captured or killed only for the specific purpose of protecting property unless an open season is designated by regulation (see Regional Schedules of open seasons).

Schedule "C" contains animals that may be captured or killed anywhere and at any time in the province. These mostly introduced species are detrimental to property and native wildlife.

SCHEDULE B

- Taricha granulosa rough-skinned newt



WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

Wildlife Management Areas are areas of special importance to fish or wildlife, administered for the purposes of conservation and intensive management. On June 8, 1987, the first six Wildlife Management Areas were designated to commemorate the Wildlife Centennial. The areas are:

- 1. Junction Wildlife Management Area, 5,300 hectares of grassland at the confluence of the Fraser and Chilcotin Rivers, provides year-round habitat for the world's largest population of non-migratory California bighorn sheep. The area supports 2,000 to 3,000 visitors annually, for limited-entry hunts, seasonal hunts and wildlife viewing.
- 2. Pitt-Addington Marsh, 2,921 hectares in the lower Pitt River Valley about 60 km east of Vancouver, is comprised of wetlands in close association with agricultural land and forest habitat. The area attracts a wide range of wetland wildlife species, in large numbers and diversity. Extensive enhancement work has been done to encourage public use.
- 3. Upper Cariboo River, 3,000 hectares 100 km northeast of Williams Lake in the upper Cariboo River



- Chilanko Marsh, 883 hectares. located near Puntzi Lake about 135 km west of Williams Lake, is important to waterfowl as well as other wildlife species associated with productive wetland areas. The area will be developed for public viewing and hunting will be al-
- 5. Dewdrop-Rosseau Creek, on the north side of Kamloops Lake, is excellent range for mule deer and California bighorn

sheep, and supports a wide variety of other wildlife species. It is popular with naturalists in the spring and hunters in the fall.

Tranquille, 253 hectares on the floodplain of the Thompson River at the head of Kamloops Lake, lies within the Kamloops city boundaries. The area provides excellent wetland habitat for abundant migratory waterfowl, song birds, and other wildlife species. Easily accessible by Kamloops residents, it is a popular area for bird-watching. Hunting is prohibited.

- Skedans Islands, 25 hectares:
- 8. Limestone Islands, 50 hectares; and
- 9. Reef Island, 250 hectares, 7, 8 and 9 are located midway on the east coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands; these three Wildlife Management Areas were established to protect seabird nesting colonies and provide accessible low impact viewing of seabird and marine wildlife, as part of wilderness tourism.
- Green Mountain, 300 hectares of alpine and subalpine area about 32 km southwest of Nanaimo, on Vancouver Island, provides critical habitat for the Vancouver Island marmot, an endangered species which occurs only on Vancouver Island.
- 11. South Arm Marshes, 850 hectares in the South Arm of Fraser River are important waterfowl/fisheries areas and are among the last of the natural islands and habitat in the midst of massive urban concentration. The area includes Duck, Barber, Woodland and Rose and Kirkland Islands.
- 12. Englishman River Estuary Wildlife Management Area. 873 hectares of largely foreshore habitat located near Parksville on the eastern side of Vancouver Island. The area provides internationally significant habitat for waterfowl, including critical staging habitat for black brant.
- 13. South Okanagan, 434 hectares located at the north end of Osoyoos Lake. About 33 percent of B.C.'s endangered or threatened species are found in this area.

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
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A TOOTH FOR TRUTH - THE HARVEST CARD TOOTH RETURN PROGRAM

HARVEST DATA CARD

We'd like to know the exact age of the black bear, moose, deer, and elk you have successfully hunted this season. If you send us a tooth sample along with your completed Harvest Card, our regional technicians will analyze it. We'll

send you a "Management Participant" jacket crest as a token of our appreciation for your help. At certain times, because of the volume of teeth sent in for aging, some delays in handling and processing may be experienced. Special Harvest Data Card envelopes (postage paid) will be provided at the time of your licence purchase, or will be mailed with Limited Entry Hunting authorizations. If a Harvest Data Card return envelope is not provided for you at the time of your licence purchase, please contact your nearest Wildlife Office or licence sub-issuer for a postage paid return envelope. For each tooth you submit for aging please indicate clearly your hunter number, name, and complete mailing address. This information will ensure that further processing delays are avoided.

Ungulate's Teeth: A lower front tooth complete with root from your moose, elk, or deer is required for accurate aging. The tooth is most easily removed by making cuts as deeply as possible on both sides of the tooth, hooking thumb over the top of the tooth and rotating the tooth forward, then cutting the root free. See the back side of the Harvest Card return envelope. Please do not submit a tooth for a deer taken on Vancouver

Black Bears Teeth: It is very important to the wildlife biologists of BC Environment to know the range of ages of black bears that are hunted.

It will be some time before information about black bears can be printed on the orange Harvest Data Card envelopes, however, these envelopes should be used for the return of black bear teeth.

The tooth required is one of the upper premolars. The premolars are the small teeth directly behind the large canines. They are not readily noticeable and their removal will not detract from the appearance of the skull.

If both the upper premolars are unsuitable, a lower premolar will also be acceptable. If the bear is an old bear and has lost all four premolars, a canine tooth will be accepted. Please turn in the teeth from younger bears as well as old ones. Every tooth is important.

DATA COLLECTION

The single largest source of hunter activity and game harvest information is the annual Hunter Sample Questionnaire. Every January, a large portion of the B.C. residents who have purchased a hunting licence in the previous year are sent a questionnaire referring to the species for which a particular licence was purchased. Hunters who have purchased several species licences







may receive questionnaires for more than one species and are asked to respond. Replies from those who did not hunt that season, or who were unsuccessful, are just as valuable to wildlife managers as the information from hunters who did. In addition to the standard questionnaire procedure, the Wildlife Branch will contact some hunters by telephone this season.

Periodic game checks, compulsory inspection and the voluntary tooth return program for deer, moose, elk and black bear all provide valuable information for wildlife managers across the province. From this information, managers can determine who is hunting, where they are hunting, how long they have hunted for and other important information about the animal taken. This accurate information enables managers to set very specific hunting regulations on a year to year basis, reducing heavy harvests in some areas and extending the season in others to balance the needs of the animal population against the needs of the public.

Without adequate information, managers must set very conservative harvest levels to ensure that an overharvest does not occur. The manager's choices are then limited to restricting harvest by closing areas, reducing season lengths, or applying Limited Entry Hunting. In this situation, open hunting is unacceptable as it risks overharvesting and possible long term damage to the resource.

Good information makes for good game management and good hunting!

TAXIDERMY, TANNING AND MEATCUTTING

Many hunters wish to have their trophies mounted for display in their homes, or to have the hides tanned for leather and other articles, while an even larger number use the services of a professional meatcutter. These businesses are required under the Wildlife Act and the regulations to keep records of their transactions.

The regulations state that the following information must be recorded;

- (a) the total number of wildlife or parts of them of each species acquired.
- (b) the date of receipt of the wildlife or parts of them. (c) the name and address of the person from whom wildlife or parts of them were acquired, and
- (d) the serial number, date and type of licence under which the wildlife or part of it was taken.

In order to fulfill these requirements the hunter, when he or she takes the parts of the animal he or she wishes processed to the business concerned, must take with him or her the following documentation:

- 1. his or her hunting licence.
- the species licence booklet with the appropriately


- Limited Entry Hunting Authorization, if such is required in order to hunt the animal.
- Compulsory Inspection Data Sheet, which confirms that the animal has been inspected by an officer of BC Environment, where such an inspection is required.
- his or her trapping licence, if the animal was taken under that authority.
- the valid permit that allows possession of the animal if a permit is required in exceptional circumstances.

Normally a hunter would not be required to have either a trapping licence or permit for a big game animal. in addition to items 1 to 4.

The question is frequently asked, "Why do I need this documentation?" The answer is simply that presentation of the documentation helps to protect the recipient, i.e. the taxidermist, tanner or meatcutter, from prosecution for illegal possession; it is required by law, and a "paper trail" exists should an investigation be required. In addition, some taxidermists, as agents for their clients. present the necessary parts of game animals for compulsory inspection by an officer of the Ministry, where the hunter is unable to do so personally. In such cases it is mandatory that the hunter provide the taxidermist with all the information required for the inspection, including the location of the kill. If such information cannot be produced by the agent, who may also be a guide outfitter in the case of a non-resident, then the animal may be seized by the Ministry until all the documentation is complete. Difficulties in such situations occur often enough that hunters should take special care to ensure that all information is available to an inspecting officer.

EXPORT FROM THE PROVINCE

When a big game animal has been processed by a taxidermist, a tanner or meatcutter, it may be exported to the hunter who lives in another province or in another country. An export permit is required if the animal is exported more than 30 days from the date of kill. If exported less than 30 days from the date of the kill, either the species licence or (where compulsory inspection is required) the Compulsory Inspection Data Sheet may serve as an export permit. In the case of an animal For management units 7-35, 7-42, 7-57, 7-58. (Note: includes parts of Sikanni-Muskwa Foothills Moose Special Area)



requiring a C.I.T.E.S. (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Fauna and Flora) permit, this permit may also be required for grizzly bear, black bear, wolf, cougar, lynx or bobcat.

British Columbia is part of a North American system of recording wild sheep identification and hence all sheep horns that are taken to a taxidermist in the province, must be inspected by an officer of the Ministry and a numbered plug inserted in one of the horns before the animal can be exported, or re-exported here if the animal originated outside the province.

Where a hunter or taxidermist, tanner or meatcutter has any doubt or questions about how to proceed under any circumstances which are not covered in the foregoing, he or she should contact BC Environment as soon as possible.

BEAR AND COUGAR MEAT

To prevent possible infection by trichinosis, bear meat or cougar meat should not be consumed unless it has been cooked at a temperature and for a time sufficient to allow all parts of the meat to reach a minimum internal temperature of 65.6 degrees C (150 degrees F).

TAKE CARE OF YOUR GAME MEAT

For many people the opportunity to dine on flavourful wild meat is one of the prime benefits of hunting. Others, out of sorry past experience, consider game meat quite unpalatable. Which will it be - gourmet or "gamey"? The difference depends much less on the skill of the qualified butcher who may cut the steaks and roasts for your table than it does on the care you take as a hunter in your initial treatment of the carcass. The basic rules:

- place your shot carefully for a quick, clean kill with little damaged meat.
- clean the animal as soon as possible.
- keep the meat free of hair, dirt and other contami-
- cool the carcass out, and keep it cool. Don't expose it to heat from a car motor, fumes or road dust.

B.C. has specific regulations on the construction and use of campfires in wilderness areas. Please contact the local Forest District Office for this information.

SECTION D

MAJOR REGULATION CHANGES

- Some open season dates for trapping have been adjusted for 1994-1995. Please see the open seasons schedule on page 86.
- Open trapping seasons continue for fisher in Regions 3, 5, 6 and 7 for 1994-1995. Please see FISHER MANAGEMENT on page 85.
- Trappers should note the 1994-1995 Schedule of Royalties on page 84.
- The exemption allowing trappers to use recorded or electronic calls to hunt wolf, coyote or fox is eliminated.
- Trappers must have completed a trapper education course since July 1, 1982 to qualify for a licence.
- Muskrat and mink seasons in Region 2 are adjusted to allow fur to reach peak primeness before trapping begins.
- Fisher compulsory inspection of carcasses is eliminated in Region 5.
- Squirrel and bobcat seasons are modified in Region 8 to allow pelts to reach peak primeness.
- Lynx the quota in Region 8 is removed and season expanded.

THE FUR MANAGEMENT PROGRAM IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

In British Columbia, some 6,000 trappers actively manage 16 furbearer species, following standards and legislation developed by the Ministry. About half of the province's trappers are Aboriginal. The recent accomplishments of the Fur Management Program include:

- "Management Guidelines For Trappers" are available for mink, marten, fisher, lynx, wolverine, beaver and muskrat.
- Continuing courses for licenced trappers who had not had formal trapper education since before the 1982/83 season.
- Continued research into marten habitat needs and developed marten habitat guidelines for the Montane Spruce biogeoclimatic zone.
- Continued monitoring of lynx and fisher populations in B.C.

TRAPPING AND HUNTING SEASONS FOR FURBEARERS

Trapping and hunting seasons for furbearers have changed little since they were originally set in the 1950s -1970s. For some species, they do not reflect the appropriate

period of primeness or biological criteria. Further, there has been inconsistency across similar geographic areas and even within a region. Appropriate seasons were developed using the following criteria:

- 1. pelt primeness
- vulnerability of age and sex classes to harvesting
- 3. management concern for the species
- abundance (seasons where numbers are nil or scarce are not warranted unless the objective is to prevent dispersal of a colonizing furbearer)
- consistency across the province (or in northern / southern areas)
- 6. consistency across species caught in the same sets and at the same time
- available and legislated humane harvesting tools.

This review gives the trapper the greatest flexibility within periods of primeness for "Class I" species; those present on a trapline in manageable numbers. These are species such as beaver, muskrat, mink and marten. Note that even within a region, furbearers may prime at different times of year. It is up to the trapper to use his or her local knowledge to properly manage and harvest these furbearers at the appropriate times. "Class II" species move between and among traplines; these are species such as fisher, wolverine and lynx. Greater care is necessary in managing these species and seasons are set to protect vulnerable age groups, in particular the breeding females.

DEFINITIONS

egg trap - means a holding device set in a manner designed to capture a raccoon by a front paw.

foot snare - means a snare that is designed to capture the animal for which it is set by the foot or leg.

trapping - means the act of setting or placing a trap in an operative condition, or killing by the use of a firearm.

fur-bearer - means any fox, badger, beaver, marten, fisher, Canada lynx, bobcat, mink, muskrat, land ofter, sea ofter, raccoon, skunk, red squirrel, weasel (ermine), wolverine, wolf, coyote and black bear.

killing snare - means any trap that is designed to capture the animal for which it is set by the neck.

killing trap - means any trap or trapset that is designed to kill an animal.

leg-hold trap - means a trap or device, other than a snare, which is set in such a way as to capture the animal for which it is set by the leg or foot. modified leg-hold trap - means a trap which has a minimum space of 5 mm between the jaws of the trap when in a closed position or has manufactured pads made of a rubber-like substance fastened to the trap jaws.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

These regulations apply to all ungranted Crown land in the Province.

- It is an offence to set a trap for, hunt, kill, take or capture a fur-bearing animal in any area of the Province unless you are:
 - (a) the registered holder of the trap-line for that area, or
 - (b) authorized by regulations or a permit.
- Registration of a trap-line on Crown land may only be granted to a person 19 years of age or older who is a citizen of Canada or has the status of a permanent resident of Canada.

No more than one trap-line shall be registered to a person. Registration of a trapline does not

- (a) give the holder of a trap-line any proprietary rights in wildlife, or
- (b) restrict the rights of another person
 - (i) to hunt, or
 - (ii) to capture wildlife where authorized by regulations or a permit.
- The boundaries of a registered trap-line are defined by the Regional Manager. The relinquishment or transfer of a trap-line must be approved by the Regional Manager.
- No person shall continue to hold a registered trap-line unless he or she is in possession of a valid licence to trap (or is otherwise authorized to trap) and either
 - (a) carries on active trapping on his or her registered trap-line to the satisfaction of the Regional Manager, or
 - (b) obtains permission from the Regional Manager to temporarily discontinue the use of his or her registered trapline for a period not exceeding two years.
- Where the holder of a registered trap-line fails to
 - (a) renew his or her licence annually, or
 - (b) use his or her trap-line, the Regional Manager shall cancel the registration of that trap-line.

A person fails to use a trap-line, where within a year that person fails to take from the trap-line fur-bearing animals of a value of \$200, or 50 pelts, except where it is unreasonable to expect that value of animals or pelts to be harvested from the trap-line

6. A person who knowingly damages or in-





- terferes with a lawfully set trap commits an offence
- 7 A person who leaves a trap set after the last day of the open season for the trapping of fur-bearing animals commits an offence.
- 8. It is an offence to have live wildlife in your personal possession except under a licence or permit or as provided by regulation.

 Note: a trapping licence does not authorize the possession of live wildlife.
- The use of electronic or recorded calls is banned for hunting furbearers.
- 10. A trapping licence will not be issued to a person who has not satisfactorily completed a British Columbia Trapper Education Program course since July 1, 1982.

TRAPPING REGULATIONS

- 1. It is an offence to trap unless you
 - (a) are authorized to trap, or
 - (b) have completed, since July 1, 1982, a trapper education course which is approved by the Director.
- 2. It is an offence to:
 - (a) use a leg-hold trap, (except a leg-hold trap designed for wolves) which is fastened solidly, if there is more than 30 cm of chain between the trap and the point to which it is fastened,
 - (b) use a leg-hold trap designed to trap wolves which is fastened solidly, if there is more than 60 cm of chain between the trap and the point to which it is fastened.
 - (c) trap beaver, otter, mink or muskrat on land by means of a leg-hold trap, unless the trap is equipped with a submerging device,
 - (d) not use the minimum weight of 150 grams (6 oz), required to be securely attached to all muskrat submerging sets smaller than size no. 1-1/2,
 - (e) use a leg-hold trap which has teeth or other projections on the jaws of the trap,
 - (f) use a killing snare on land unless the snare is
 - (i) equipped with a locking device, or (ii) designed to catch squirrels.
 - (g) trap a wolverine, marten, fisher, weasel, skunk or squirrel except by means of a killing trap, a live box trap or a killing snare.

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- (h) set spring poles or running poles unless they are equipped with a killing trap.
- use a trap equipped with a spearing device,
- (j) trap, hunt, kill or take a black bear, except by the use of a rifle, shotgun, or bow.
- (k) trap a wolf, fox, coyote, lynx or bobcat, except by means of a killing trap, a modified leg-hold trap, a live box trap, foot snare or a killing snare.
- use a snare made of wire heavier than 20 gauge unless licenced or authorized to trap, or
- (m) use a snare made of braided wire unless licenced or authorized to trap, or
- (n) use any Conibear trap larger than, but not including #220 for land sets within any municipality in Region 2,
- (o) trap a fur-bearing animal, and if the animal is alive when you check the trap, fail to immediately release or kill the animal.
- (p) trap a raccoon except by means of a killing trap, killing snare, live box trap or egg trap.
- 3. (a) A holder of a licence, permit or other authorization to trap commits an offence unless that person examines the holding or non-killing traps he or she has set on the trap line at least once every 72 hours, and the egg-trap(s) he or she has set for raccoons at least once every 24 hours.
 - (b) A holder of a licence, permit or other authorization to trap on private property commits an offence unless that person examines the holding or non-killing traps he or she has set on private property at least once every 24 hours.
- It is an offence to trap within 200 m of a dwelling, unless you use:
 - (a) if trapping on land, a live box trap, or(b) if trapping on or in water,
 - (i) a Conibear trap not larger than size No. 330, or equivalent
 - (ii) leg-hold traps not larger than size No. 2, or
 - (iii) submarine traps.
- It is an offence to trap on private property without a trapping licence and the written permission of the property owner.

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MODIFICATION OF LEG-HOLD TRAPS

A modified leg-hold trap is a leg-hold trap with padded or offset jaws.

Trappers can modify existing leg-hold traps to comply with the trapping regulations. Standard coil spring or long-spring can be modified by the following methods:

- The jaws must be modified to allow a minimum of 5 mm or 3/16 inch space between the jaws when closed, or
- A type of shim may be fastened between the jaws (near the sides of the jaws) causing the trap to remain open a minimum of 5 mm or 3/16 inch when in the "closed" position.

Some existing leg-hold traps may be modified by replacing standard jaws with offset jaws or padded jaws and replacement lever. Replacement levers are required with padded jaws as standard levers will not close the trap properly.

A MESSAGE TO THE TRAPPER

- The ASSIGNED TRAPPER NUMBER (A.T.N.) is required by the Fur Trader when exporting fur, selling fur, and paying fur royalties.
 - Please remember to write your Assigned Trapper Number on a slip of paper or letter when shipping your fur to a fur trader. This will prevent delays in getting your furs to market and cash returns to you. Fur traders cannot ship or sell your fur without recording your Assigned Trapper Number.
- The Wildlife Branch reserves the right to remove nuisance animals from Crown land, whether or not the Crown land in question is under a trap-line registration.
- Trapping within ecological reserves is prohibited.
- 4. You are reminded that under Sections 247 and 446 of the Criminal Code of Canada it is an offence for anyone to willfully cause or permit to be caused unnecessary pain, suffering, or injury to an animal or injury to any person.
- As approved humane traps become available, trapping regulations restricting or prohibiting the use of certain other traps in the capture of various animals will be brought into effect.
- Any raw pelt or skin of a fur-bearing animal shipped out of the Province must be accompanied by a Royalty Fur Export Permit.
- Any trapper accidentally capturing a weasel on Vancouver Island or on the Queen Charlotte Islands (M.U.'s 6-12 and 6-13) must forward the pelt and the carcass to the local BC Environment Office.
- 8. Any trapper accidentally capturing a fisher

in Regions 1, 2, 4, or 8 is requested to forward the pelt and carcass to the nearest regional wildlife office.

COMPULSORY REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Any wolf taken by trapping on Vancouver Island or in the Kootenay Region; any bobcat, lynx and wolverine taken by trapping in the Kootenay Region; and any lynx, including the complete carcass, taken by trapping in the Okanagan Region must be submitted for inspection to an official of BC Environment for the purpose of collecting information required for management of these species.

Reporting must occur on a monthly basis (by the end of each calendar month).

Information required for compulsory inspection includes:

- the location where the animal was trapped
- · the date the animal was killed
- the number of traps used and days set before the animal was killed
- · the sex of the animal
- a tooth from all bobcat and lynx taken in the Kootenay Region
- the skull from all wolf taken in the Kootenay Region and on Vancouver Island.

Note: Gloves should be worn while handling wolf carcasses as a precaution against contracting hydatid disease.

FUR ROYALTIES

- When a person is in possession of a pelt or skin of a fur-bearing animal not raised in captivity on which a royalty has not already been paid under this section, and fails to pay to the Minister of Finance a royalty on each pelt or skin in his or her possession, as prescribed by regulation, that person commits an offence.
- Section (1) above does not apply to the holder of a trapping licence, or a person exempted from holding a trapping licence when selling pelts, lawfully taken by him or her, to the holder of a fur trader's licence.
- A person who kills a fur-bearing animal under the authority of a licence to hunt wildlife is exempt from paying a royalty in relation to the pelt or skin of that animal, unless he or she intends to offer the pelt or skin for sale.

FUR TRADING REGULATIONS

- Licenced fur traders must submit a full and complete return on all wildlife that has been or is in their possession for each calendar month, within 30 days of the last day of the month to which the report relates. A Fur Trader's Return Form is provided for that purpose.
- The Assigned Trapper Number of every trapper from whom furs are received (except furs taken under a hunting licence, permit or on a reserve) must be recorded on the monthly return.
- All licenced fur traders are now required to measure any lynx pelt acquired by them at the end of every calendar month and to submit all measurements on prescribed forms.
- The Fur Trader's Return Forms and Lynx Pelt Survey Forms are available at your BC Environment regional office.

LICENCE FEES

The fees payable for the issuance of a trapping licence shall be:

- For a trapping licence issued to a resident in the Province to trap game....... \$17.00 (includes surcharge for Habitat Conservation Fund)
- For a duplicate licence to a person who, upon satisfactory proof, shows that his trapping licence has been lost or destroyed \$4.00.
- To transfer registered trap-line rights to a person or group of persons \$25.00
 For a furtrader's licence \$50.00
- For a furtrader to trade from a place of business in another province \$400.00

Trapping licences shall be valid from the date of issuance to June 30 following.

PROVINCIAL PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS

Registered trap-line tenure within Provincial parks is subject to the provisions of the *Park Act* and Park Regulations.

Trappers are required to obtain a Park or Resource Use Permit to trap that part of their trap-line occurring within a provincial park or recreation area. The permit can be obtained by contacting the nearest provincial parks office. The permit fee is \$100.

TRAP-LINE CABINS

Trappers should register their trap-line cabins on Crown land. Cabin applications may take up to six months to process. Contact the Wildlife Branch of BC Environment for further information.

BLACK BEARS AND TRAPPERS

Bag Limits: Two black bear may be taken per year by a licenced trapper on his or her trapping area, during the indicated open seasons. Teeth: In 1991, black bears were placed on the "A Tooth for the Truth" program. The Wildlife Branch also wishes to collect black bear teeth from trappers. As for black bear harvested by hunters, the orange Harvest Data Card envelopes should be used for the return of black bear teeth. The tooth required is one of the upper premolars. Read the section of the "Tooth for the Truth Program" for more information on how to remove a black bear premolar.

THE TRAPPER QUESTIONNAIRE

Over the past 5 years, many of you have received a "Trapper Questionnaire" from the Wildlife Branch. This questionnaire asked about the numbers of furbearers that you trapped, the effort you put into trapping, and what the habitat and prey were like.

How is this information is used?

In conjunction with the information on the numbers of furbearers that are trapped, as monitored by your ATN or Assigned Trapper Number, the results of the trapper questionnaire are used to tell the Wildlife Branch about the status of the populations of furbearers and to indicate to us where we should be concerned and direct our management efforts.

Who gets a questionnaire?

You may be interested to know how trappers are chosen to answer the trapper questionnaire. We can't send a questionnaire to every single trapper in the province because that would be too much work. Instead, we send a questionnaire to a sample of trappers, ensuring that this sample comes from all

The egg trap is an acceptable and approved trap for raccoon. This trap must be checked at least once every 24 hours.

FISHER MANAGEMENT

In 1991, the Wildlife Program identified a decline in fisher populations. In cooperation with the B.C. Trappers Association, a strategy was developed to address this decline and to recover populations. This strategy included closing the trapping season and continuing to collect and monitor carcasses from incidentally trapped fishers.

Carcasses were collected in the Cariboo sub-region from 1988/89 to 1993/94.

Carcass collection revealed that:

- Each trapper incidentally trapped an average of 2 fishers.
- More juveniles were trapped in 1990/91 compared to 1988/89.
- There were more females trapped than males.

This means that reproduction is occurring and that recovery has begun. It is very important that the harvest of fishers be limited to allow fishers to reproduce and spread. However, it is very difficult for a trapper NOT to trap fishers, because they are attracted by most baits.

What is the solution?

Our objectives with respect to fisher management are to: 1) keep the incidental catch of fishers as low as possible, and 2) monitor the status of the population.

The fisher trapping season is open in the central and northern regions of the province. Check the Regulations to determine the appropriate season in your region. You should make every attempt to avoid catching fishers. The Trapper Education Program and BC Environment have prepared a fact sheet which will help you in this endeavour. The fact sheet is available at regional offices, from the B.C. Trappers Association and from all trapper education instructors.

The submission of fisher carcasses is voluntary in the Cariboo sub-region. Each carcass should be tagged with a waterproof carcass tag which is available at regional and district BC Environment offices. Tags must





ecoprovinces in British Columbia. At the end of a trapping season, all the licenced trappers for that year are assigned a number. These numbers are called "random numbers" because they occur in no particular order. There are about 2000 licenced trappers in the province. We then use the computer to pick the numbers of, again in no particular order, about 1000 trappers. This is our sample which receives the questionnaire. This procedure ensures that the sample was picked fairly and is representative of trappers throughout the province. The results of the questionnaires are confidential. The only identifying information we use in reports is what ecoprovince the trapper lives in. We determine this from the Management Unit in which the trapline oc-

This cooperative effort between trappers and the Wildlife Program is helping to ensure fishers will continue to recover.

HOW TO NOT TRAP FISHERS

When trapping other species:

- Modify your marten box. Make the entry hole smaller, 2 1/2 - 3" in diameter and increase the length of the box.
- Remove your marten and mink traps where you see fisher signs.
- When trapping mink, do so on beaver houses well away from the cover of timber.
- Avoid using bait in lynx sets. Use scents and flashers to attract them instead.
- Do not use trail sets and trail snares where you have fishers.

Identify fisher habitat:

- Establish refuges in traditional fisher areas which you do not trap at all. This is the best method to maintain a breeding population of fishers.
- Avoid trapping in den sites. These are cavities in large cottonwoods and in large fir snags. Maintain these areas as refuges for female fishers.
- Feed fishers; establish bait piles and do not trap any species around these bait piles.
 These bait sites should be started early in the season and maintained yearly. Fishers have good memories and will return year after year if the food is still there. To avoid other critters getting to your bait, hang it in a tree.
- Educate your resident, breeding population of fishers to be trap shy. Pre-bait your sets and leave the safety clasps on traps so fishers can set them off and learn to leave traps alone.
