



#### This modification

- takes under 5 minutes per trai
- increases speed and humaneness of kill
- decreases size of trap gives better strike location, surer catch
- by hastening speed of kill, pelt is not rubbed by possible struggling of animal.
- in #220, #120 models, ensures greater ease of handling, as springs do not jump around corner of trap frame.
- is recommended by the Ontario Trappers' Association, especially for raccon, marten, fisher, beaver and offer.



#### Equipment needer


Vise

Jig (supplied on request by CAHT as funds allow)

heavy gloves

Welder's acetylene torch (butane torch not powerful enough)

wire (for wiring springs in 'set' position



#### Instruction

- 1. Before you start, study diagrams and read this carefully
- 2. Wire springs in set position for safety and convenience of handling
- 3. #330 when bending law with trigger dog, push dog up to side of trap frame; and lodge above area to be heater
- 4. Check that frame positioning har on jig is in correct place for trap being modified
- 5. Put jig in visa
- 6. Put trap in jig, and close vise tightly;
- 7. DO CHECK POSITION OF TRAP BEFORE BENDING EACH JAWISS



### GENERAL INFORMATION

#### SCHEDULE A - ZONES

The five trapping zones, based on broad climatic conditions, are basically the same as for previous years. However, they have been redescribed using the new "Management Units" as given below:

For the purpose of these Regulations:

- 1. The Management Units (abbreviated to M.U. or M.U.'s hereinafter) shall be those set out in B.C. Reg. 415/75.
- 2. The Province shall be divided into five Zones as follows: -



#### SCHEDULE B - OPEN SEASONS

The open season for trapping of each species of fur bearing animals in each zone during each year (all dates inclusive), shall be as indicated in the accompanying table (Schedule B).

Where seasons in Schedule B do not apply to complete zones, they are marked by an asterisk (\*), and these seasons, with descriptions of the periods and areas involved, are contained in Schedule C.



# REGULATIONS COVERING THE REGISTRATION OF TRAP-LINES


These regulations shall apply to all ungranted Crown land in the Province.

- Registration of a trap-line, after January 1, 1975, shall only be granted to one or more residents of the Province who are Canadian citizens 18 years of age or over, provided no persons or groups of persons shall hold more than one registered trap-line at one time and,
  - (a) where as of January 1, 1975 the holder of a registered trap-line is a resident alien eligible for Canadian citizenship, he shall establish Canadian citizenship on or before September 30, 1975 to retain and re-register a trap-line; or
  - (b) where the holder of a registered trap-line is a resident alien not yet eligible for Canadian citizenship, because of the waiting period required, he shall, to retain a registration to a trap-line, file with the Director on or before September 30, 1975, a notarized affidavit that he has applied for Canadian citizenship, including the date citizenship is expected to be granted, whereupon the Director may approve the trap-line registration.
- 2. The boundaries of a registered trap-line shall be defined by the Director or his authorized agent.
- 3. (a) A trap-line registration shall expire on June 30th following date of registration.
  - (b) The holder of a registered trap-line must, between July 1st and September 30th each year, re-register his trap-line in order to retain registration.
- No person shall continue to hold a registered trap-line unless he is in possession of a valid licence to trap and either:
  - (a) carries on active trapping on his registered trap-line to the satisfaction of the Director or his authorized agent; or
  - (b) obtains permission from the Director or his authorized agent to temporarily discontinue the active use or partially discontinue the use of his registered trap-line.
- No person shall trap within the boundaries of a trap-line registered under these regulations unless;
  - (a) he is the registered holder of that trap-line; or
  - (b) he is authorized by permit to do so by the Director or his authorized agent.
- 6. The holder of a registered trap-line shall furnish annually, on a form prescribed by the Director, an inventory of the number and kind of fur-bearing animals trapped on his registered trap-line and a list of the fur-traders or fur markets to which furs were sold.

## SPECIAL RESTRICTIONS

#### SCHEDULE C

This schedule contains descriptions of closures and open seasons in portions of zones as indicated by asterisks in Schedule B.

#### Zone.

Fox - There shall be no closed season on fox in Vancouver Island nor in Management Units 2-1 to 2-15 inclusive.

Wolverine - There shall be no open season on wolverine in Vancouver Island.

Land Otter – In Vancouver Island the open season on land otter shall be from December 1st to March 15th.


Beaver - In Vancouver Island the open season on beaver shall be from December 1st to April 15th.

#### Zone 2

Beaver - In Management Units 4-34 and 4-35 the open season on beaver shall be from November 1st to April 30th.

Muskrat - In Management Units 4-34 and 4-35 the open season on muskrat shall be from November 1st to April 30th.

#### OTHER REGULATIONS

#### Licence Restrictions

- (1) Every holder of a licence or permit to trap fur-bearing animals shall, by September 30th following the close of the trapping season, deliver to the nearest Conservation Officer a complete statement of the number and kind of fur-bearers trapped by him and of the market(s) or fur-trader(s) to which he sold fur.
- (2) No person shall be issued a trapping licence until such person has shown proof to the satisfaction of the Director or his authorized agent in that he;
  - (a) has been the holder of a previous licence to trap; or
  - (b) will serve one full trapping season, as an authorized assistant to a licenced or authorized trapper; or
  - (c) has completed, or is in the process of completing an approved Trappers Education Course.

#### Licence Fees


The fees payable for the issuance of a Trapping Licence shall be:

- (1) For a trapping licence issued to a resident in the Province to trap game ......\$5.00
- (2) For a duplicate licence issued to a person who, upon satisfactory proof, shows that his Trapping Licence has been lost or destroyed .....\$2.00

Trapping Licences shall be valid from the date of issuance to June 30th following.

#### General Restrictions

- (1) The use of leg-hold traps with a chain length in excess of 12 inches is prohibited.
- (2) The use of leg-hold traps of a smaller size than Number One as defined by the manufacturer is prohibited in the taking of fur-bearing animals unless such traps are so set as to drown the animal for which they are set.
- (3) The use of leg-hold traps in the taking of beaver or otter on land is prohibited unless such traps are equipped and used with a drowning device involving a sliding lock.



#### ROYALTIES SCHEDULE

Royalties due on pelts of fur-bearing animals trapped or taken in the wild state in British Columbia.

#### TRAPPERS CODE OF ETHICS

The Fish and Wildlife Branch acknowledges and supports the British Columbia Registered Trappers Association recommended code of conduct:

- (1) Feeding stations should be maintained to keep nonfurbearing wildlife away from set traps.
- (2) Muskrat should be trapped in relation to their food supply.
- (3) Each trapper should assist landowners in the vicinity of his trap-line in removing nuisance furbearers. Always gain the permission of private landowners before trapping.
- (4) The carcasses of diseased animals should be reported, and where possible submitted promptly, to the attention of the Fish and Wildlife Branch.
- (5) All leghold traps must be examined frequently in order to minimize the suffering of caught animals.
- (6) Humane traps designed to kill quickly should be used in trapping fur-bearing animals whenever possible.

#### ADVISORY SECTION

It is illegal to trap big game, which includes any bear, cougar, or wolf.

The Fish and Wildlife Branch reserves the right to remove nuisance animals from Crown land, whether or not the Crown land in question is under trap-line registration.

Registered trap-line tenure within Provincial Parks is subject to the provisions of the Park Act and Park Regula-

Trapping within Ecological Reserves is prohibited.

You are reminded that under Sections 231 and 402 of the Criminal Code of Canada it is an offence for anyone to willfully cause or permit to be caused unneccessary pain, suffering or injury to an animal or injury to any person.

As approved humane traps become available, trapping regulations restricting or prohibiting the use of certain other traps in the capture of various animals, will be brought into effect.

#### DEFINITIONS

"leg-hold trap" means a trap or device, other than a snare, which is set in such a way as to capture the animal for which it is set by the leg or foot.

"Furbearer" means any fox, badger, beaver, martin, fisher, Canada Lynx, bobcat, mink, muskrat, land otter, sea otter, raccoon, skunk, red squirrel, weasel (ermine) or wolverine.
