



GAME REGULATIONS, 1929-30

1. The prohibitions declared by section 9 of the "Game Act," being chapter 68 of the "Revised Statutes of British Columbia, 1924," as to the hunting, trapping, taking, possession, and killing of game, are, subject to the provisions of sections 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of these regulations, hereby removed to the extent and within the periods and limits and subject to the provisions hereinafter set out respectively as follows:—

For the purpose of defining the open seasons for big game, zone birds, and trapping of fur-bearing animals, the Province shall be divided into two districts, to be known as the Western and Eastern Districts:—

"Western District" shall mean and include all that portion of the Province situate and lying to the west of the summit of the Cascade Mountains and south of the Electoral District of Atlin.

"Eastern District" shall mean and include all of the remainder of the Province.

Provided that that portion of the Lillooet Electoral District lying to the east of a line drawn north and south (astronomic) of Alta Lake Railway Station, on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and that portion of the Skeena Electoral District lying to the east of a line drawn north and south (astronomic) of the easterly railway yard limit of Shames, on the Canadian National Railway, bounded by the southern boundary of the Electoral District of Atlin on the north and by Mainland Island on the south, shall, for all purposes in respect of open seasons on migratory game birds within the purview of the "Migratory Birds Convention Act," be construed and considered as lying within the Eastern District.

EASTERN DISTRICT (OPEN SEASONS).

Big Game.

(a) *Moose*, of the male sex, in the Electoral Districts of Atlin, Fort George, Cariboo, and in the Electoral District of Omineca (except that portion thereof covered by the watershed of the Bulkley River and tributaries thereof), open season from September 1st, 1929, to December 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

In the Electoral District of Columbia, except that portion thereof situate and lying west of the Columbia River, open season from October 1st, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(b) *Caribou*, of the male sex, in the Eastern District (except the Electoral Districts of Markkazi and Skeena and that portion of the Electoral District of Cariboo situate and lying to the west of the Fraser River, and that further portion of the Eastern District situate and lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway), open season from September 1st, 1929, to December 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(c) *Wapiti (Elk)*, of the male sex, in the Electoral Districts of Fernie, Cranbrook, and Columbia (except that portion of the Columbia Electoral District situate and lying to the west of the Columbia River), open season from October 1st, 1929, to October 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(d) *Mountain-sheep*, of the male sex, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof situate and lying to the north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and in those portions of the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet situate and lying to the south of the 52nd parallel of latitude and west of the Fraser River, open season from September 1st, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

In the Electoral Districts of Fernie, Cranbrook, and Columbia, open season from September 1st, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(e) *Mountain-goat*, in the Eastern District—except that portion thereof described as follows: "Commencing at a point on the International Boundary where it is intersected by the centre line of the Columbia River; thence northerly along the said centre line of the Columbia River to the Arrow Lakes; thence northerly following the centre line of the Arrow Lakes and Columbia River to the Canadian Pacific Railway; thence westerly along the Canadian Pacific Railway to the north boundary of Township 6, Range 26, west of 6th meridian, being a point south of Yale; thence east along the north boundary of Township 6, Range 24 and 25, to the easterly boundary of the watershed of the Fraser River; thence southerly along the easterly boundary of the said watershed to the International Boundary-line; thence easterly along said International Boundary-line to the point of commencement"—open season from September 1st, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(f) *Bear (except White or Kermadec Bear)*, in the Eastern District, open season from September 1st, 1929, to June 30th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

Provided that no *Bear* shall be trapped in the Eastern District.

(g) *Deer (Mule, White-tail, and Coast)*, throughout the Eastern District (except *White-tail Deer* in North and South Okanagan and Similkameen Electoral Districts and in the Grand Forks-Greenwood

Electoral District west of the summit of the Midway Mountains), as follows:—

Buck Deer, open season from September 1st, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Doe Deer, open season from November 15th, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Fur-bearing Animals.

(h) *Beaver, Muskrats, and Otter*, in the Eastern District—in that portion of the district described as follows: "That portion of the Eastern District situate and lying south and east of a line commencing at Birken, on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway; thence following said railway to the Lillooet Railway station; thence east to the Canadian National Railway at Ashcroft; thence following said railway in a northerly and easterly direction to the British Columbia-Alberta boundary line"—open season from March 1st, 1930, to April 15th, 1930, both dates inclusive; in the remainder of the Eastern District, open season from March 1st, 1930, to May 15th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

All other fur-bearing animals, in the Eastern District, open season from November 1st, 1929, to February 28th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

Game Birds.

(i) *Ducks (except Wood and Elder Ducks)*, *Wilson Snipe, Coots, Geese, and Brant*, throughout the Eastern District, open season from September 15th, 1929, to December 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive; provided that shooting shall not commence before one hour before sunrise or extend one hour beyond sunset on any day during such open season.

(j) *Grouse (Blue only)*, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof known as the Grand Forks-Greenwood Electoral District and that portion of the Similkameen Electoral District situate and lying to the east of Allison Creek, the South Similkameen River, and the Pasayten River, open season from September 14th, 1929, to October 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Grouse (Blue, Red, commonly called Willow, and Franklin), and *Pheasants*, in the Electoral Districts of Omineca, Skeena, and Atlin Electoral Districts, situate and lying within the boundaries of the Eastern District, open season from September 14th, 1929, to October 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive. In the remainder of the Eastern District, *Ruffed Grouse*, open season from September 14th, 1929, to September 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive; *Blue and Franklin Grouse*, open season from September 14th, 1929, to October 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Prairie-chicken or Sharp-tailed Grouse, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof known as the Electoral District of Fort George situate and lying to the north and east of the Rocky Mountains, open season from September 1st, 1929, to October 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

In the Eastern District, in those portions of the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet situate and lying to the south of the 52nd parallel of latitude, and in the Electoral District of Salmon Arm situate and lying west of a line running due north and south through the village of Chase, and in that portion of the Kamloops Electoral District situate and lying south of the Thompson River and Kamloops Lake within the Railway Belt, open season from October 15th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(k) *Quail*, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof known as the Electoral Districts of Similkameen and South Okanagan, open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(l) *Pheasants*, cock birds only, in the Eastern District, in the Electoral District of South Okanagan; that portion of the Similkameen Electoral District situate and lying to the east of Allison Creek, the South Similkameen River, and the Pasayten River; in the Electoral District of North Okanagan (except that portion situate and lying to the east of the Colstream Municipality), and in the Municipality and District Municipality of Salmon Arm, and all that tract of land situate and lying in Kamloops Division of Yale District—more particularly described as follows: "Commencing at the mouth of Chum Creek near Squilax; thence upstream along the course line of said Chum Creek to point where same intersects the north boundary of Section 23, Township 21, Range 12, west of 6th meridian; thence east along the north boundary of Section 23 and 24 in said township to the west boundary of said township; thence south along the east boundary of Township 21, 20, 19, 18, and 17 in said Range 12 to the southwest corner of Section 30 in Township 17, Range 11, west of 6th meridian; thence east to the south-east corner of Section 27 in said township; thence south to the centre of the pond between Genouma and Deep Creeks; thence easterly and northerly along said Deep Creek Road to the south boundary of the Municipality of Salmon Arm; thence east, north, and west along the boundaries of said Salmon Arm Municipality to the shore of Salmon Arm of Shuswap Lake; thence easterly and northerly through Shuswap Lake to Chummonson Narrows; thence

westerly through Shuswap Lake to point of commencement"—open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds only, in the Eastern District, in the North Okanagan Electoral District comprising that certain parcel or tract of land lying within the drainage area of Dutton, Harrie, and Dosette Creeks, and being bounded on the north by the Croighton Valley-Vernon Road, on the west by the eastern boundary of the Colstream Municipality, and on the south by the south boundary of the North Okanagan Electoral District, open season from October 15th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds only, in the Eastern District, in that portion of the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet situate and lying along the Fraser River from Kiske Creek on the north to Tessa Creek on the south, extending a distance of ten miles on either side of the Fraser River, and in that portion of the Electoral District of Yale situate and lying north of Spences Bridge, open season from October 15th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(m) *European Partridges*, in the Eastern District, in the Electoral Districts of North and South Okanagan, open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

In the Municipality of Salmon Arm, open season from November 1st, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

WESTERN DISTRICT (OPEN SEASONS).

Big Game.

(n) *Mountain-goat*, throughout the Western District, except on Vancouver Island, open season from September 14th, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(o) *Bear (except White or Kermadec Bear)*, throughout the Western District, open season from September 14th, 1929, to June 30th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

Provided that no *Bear* shall be trapped in the Western District.

(p) *Deer (Mule, White-tail, and Coast)*, throughout the Western District (except Queen Charlotte Islands, Hornby Island, and those portions of Vancouver Island known as North and South Saanich and Highland Districts), as follows:—

Buck Deer, open season from September 14th, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Doe Deer, open season from November 15th, 1929, to November 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

In those portions of Vancouver Island known as the Highland, North and South Saanich Districts (*Buck Deer* only), open season from September 14th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Further, for the purpose of describing the Highland District mentioned in these regulations, the same is hereby defined as follows: "Starting at the junction of the Finlayson Arm Road and the Malahat Highway; thence south along the Malahat and Island Highway to Atkin Road; thence east along Atkin Road to Thetis Lake Road; thence north along Thetis Lake Road to Munn's Road; thence easterly and southerly along Munn's Road to Prospect Lake Road; thence along Prospect Lake Road north and east to the right-of-way of the interurban line of the British Columbia Electric Railway; thence along the said right-of-way to Tod Inlet Road; thence along Tod Inlet Road to Saanich Arm; thence along Saanich Arm to Goldstream Creek; thence following Goldstream Creek to the Finlayson Arm Road to the Malahat Highway."

Fur-bearing Animals.

(q) *Beaver, Muskrats, and Otter*, in the Western District (except *Beaver and Muskrats* on Vancouver Island), open season from March 1st, 1930, to April 15th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

All other fur-bearing animals, in the Western District, open season from December 1st, 1929, to February 28th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

Game Birds.

(r) *Ducks (except Wood and Elder Ducks)*, *Wilson Snipe, Coots, and Geese*, in the Western District, open season from October 15th, 1929, to January 31st, 1930, both dates inclusive. (Legal time when shooting can be commenced on the opening day, 5.31 a.m.)

Buck Brant, in the Western District, open season from November 15th, 1929, to February 28th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

(s) *Ruffed Grouse*, throughout the Western District, open season from September 15th, 1929, to September 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive. Provided that the use of decoys in the hunting of *Ruffed Grouse* is prohibited.

(t) *Grouse (Blue only)*, in the Western District, throughout Vancouver Island (except South Saanich and Highland Districts) and in the remainder of the district (except Hornby and Denman

Islands), open season from September 14th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

On Vancouver Island (except the Electoral District, open season from September 14th, 1929, to September 30th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Provided that there shall be a close season on *Ruffed Grouse* (commonly called *Willow Grouse*) throughout the Western District.

(u) *Quail (except Bobwhite and Mountain Quail)*, in the Western District, on Vancouver Island in those portions thereof situate and lying to the south and east of Qualicum River (except Oak Bay Municipality), and on Saanich Island, open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

On Denman and Saturna Islands, open season from October 15th, 1929, to October 31st, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(v) *Pheasants*, cock birds only, in the Western District, on Vancouver Island (except Oak Bay Municipality and that portion of Vancouver Island situate and lying north of Guxter Island), and on Gabriola, Texada, Sidney, Moresby, Denker, Maxana, Galiano, and Saturna Islands, open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds only, in the Western District, on the Mainland (except those portions known as the Squamish Valley, that area situate and lying between Lewis and Toba Inlets, and all Crown lands west of the former west boundary of the Municipality of Point Grey), open season from October 15th, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(w) *European Partridges*, in the Western District, on Vancouver Island (except Oak Bay Municipality), in South Saanich and Highland Districts, and in the North Saanich District, and on the Mainland in the Municipality of Delta, open season from November 1st, 1929, to November 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

BAG LIMITS (EASTERN AND WESTERN DISTRICTS).

Big Game.

In respect of big game throughout the Province as defined in the "Game Act," no person shall anywhere in the Eastern District kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than two *Deer*, only one of which may be of the female sex, and in the Western District no person shall have in their possession during the open season more than three *Deer*, only one of which may be of the female sex; and no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season, anywhere in the Province, more than two *Grizzly Bear* and three *Bear* of any other species.

In that portion of the Province north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than two *Mountain-sheep*.

In the Electoral Districts of Fernie, Cranbrook, and Columbia, and in those portions of the Cariboo and Lillooet Electoral Districts situate and lying to the south of the 52 parallel of latitude and west of the Fraser River, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than one *Mountain-sheep*.

In that portion of the Eastern District lying to the north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than two *Caribou*, and in those portions of the Eastern District lying to the south of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than one *Caribou*.

Throughout the Province no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the open season more than one *Wapiti (Elk)*, one *Moose*, and one *Mountain-goat*.

Game Birds.

No person shall in any district hereinafter designated kill or take on any one day any greater number of game birds than the daily bag limit hereinafter set out respectively: nor kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season any greater number of game birds than the total bag limits set out:—

Eastern District—Pheasants (cock birds only): Daily bag limit, 4; total bag limit, 15.

Quail (except Bobwhite and Mountain Quail): Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 100.

Grouse (Blue only): Daily bag limit, 6 of one species or 12 of all species; total bag limit, 50 in the aggregate.

Prairie-chicken or Sharp-tailed Grouse: In the Electoral District of Fort George—Daily bag limit, 6; total bag limit, 50. In the Electoral Districts of Cariboo, Lillooet, Salmon Arm, and Kamloops—Daily bag limit, 3; total bag limit, 12.

European Partridges: Daily bag limit, 6; total bag limit, 25.

Western District—Pheasants (cock birds only): Daily bag limit, 4; total bag limit, 15.

European Partridges: Daily bag limit, 6; total bag limit, 25.

Grouse (Blue only): Daily bag limit, 5; total bag limit, 25.

Quail (except Bobwhite and Mountain Quail): Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 50.

Throughout the Province—Ducks: Daily bag limit, 20; total bag limit, 150.

Geese: Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 50.

Brant: Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 50.

Wilson Snipe: Daily bag limit, 25; total bag limit, 150.

Coots: Daily bag limit, 25; total bag limit, 150.

Ruffed Grouse: Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 50.

Every person shall, upon the request of any Game Warden or Constable furnish satisfactory proof to him of the locality and dates on which any game was by him killed or taken.

2. The prohibitions declared by subsection (1) of section 96 of the "Game Act," as to the buying, selling, and having in possession of big game, so far as the same relate to game lawfully killed or taken, are hereby removed to the extent and within the periods and limits and subject to the provisions hereinafter set out, as follows:—

(a) *Moose and Caribou*, bulls over one year old, in the Electoral Districts of Atlin and Omineca, from September 1st, 1929, to December 15th, 1929, both dates inclusive.

(b) *Bear (except White or Kermadec Bear)*, in the Eastern District, from September 1st, 1929, to June 30th, 1930, both dates inclusive; in the Western District, from September 14th, 1929, to June 30th, 1930, both dates inclusive.

Provided that no other game must be sold in any part of the Province.

3. The open seasons declared by these regulations shall not apply to the following parts of the Province, namely:—

(a) Kaien Island, in the Prince Rupert Electoral District.

(b) That portion of the Bowdoin Electoral District known as the Colony Farm.

(c) Those portions of the Electoral Districts of Parkman, Langara, and the Electoral Districts of Fernie and Central Park.

(d) That portion of Nanaimo Harbour described as follows:—Between high-water mark on Vancouver Island and low-water mark as follows: Commencing at Brecken Point, Departure Bay, near the City of Nanaimo; thence in an easterly direction to the most westerly point on Newcastle Island; thence south-easterly to the most easterly point on Newcastle Island; thence to the most westerly point on Protection Island; thence south-easterly to Galloway Point on Protection Island; thence to Jack's point on Vancouver Island; thence in a westerly direction to Stevens and Wright's single-mill on Vancouver Island.

(e) That portion of the Nelson District described as follows: Commencing on the north shore of the West Arm of Kootenay Lake at Willow Point Wharf; thence following the Duhamel or 6-Mile Creek Road to the intersection of the said Duhamel Creek Road with the First West Fork of Duhamel Creek; thence following the said West Fork to its source; thence in a southerly direction following the divide between Duhamel Creek and the West Arm of Kootenay Lake and Grohman Creek to the mouth of the said Grohman Creek; thence across the West Arm of Kootenay Lake to the south shore of the said West Arm to a point known as the slaughter-house; thence following the south shore of the said West Arm in an easterly direction to a point opposite Willow Point Wharf; thence across the said West Arm to the point of commencement. Provided that the provisions of this subsection shall only apply in respect to the hunting of game birds.

4. No person shall attempt to kill any migratory game birds with a net.

5. The open seasons declared by these regulations shall not apply to the hunting, taking, or having in possession of *Quail, Pheasants, Prairie-chicken (Sharp-tailed Grouse), or Partridge* at any place when the surface of the ground at that place is wholly or partly covered with snow.

6. No person shall hunt, kill, or take any *Moose, Caribou, Wapiti, or Deer* while swimming, and the hunting, killing, or taking of any game by use of tracer bullets is prohibited.

7. No person shall use a power boat or aeroplane to disturb any migratory game birds with the intent of driving such birds towards any person who is lying in wait for the purpose of shooting, killing, or taking such migratory game birds.

NOTE.—There is no open season on any game other than in the open seasons and during the periods mentioned in the foregoing regulations.

A PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM THE GAME DEPARTMENT.

DON'T destroy fences or property of the farmer and always ask for permission to shoot over his property.

DON'T shoot unless you are clearly sure and are sure of what you are shooting at. It may be a cow, a dog, or a man.

DON'T go hunting until you are acquainted with the Game Laws.

DON'T shoot harmless wild life. Practise on crows, magpies, and that ilk.

DON'T enter a boat or a car with a loaded gun or rifle.

DON'T discharge firearms from an automobile or other vehicle. It is dangerous and against the law.

LEAVE a clean camp and a clean record. You may want to come back.

BE A SPORTSMAN—respect the rights of others. Report violations of the Act.

Special.—Don't start forest fires. Never drop a lighted match, cigar, or cigarette, or knock live ashes from your pipe. Make your camp-fire safe and put it out before leaving. The Forestry Department claims that the serious increase in forest fires every year at the first of the open season is caused by hunters. If this is true and hunters are not more careful we might be forced to prohibit hunting in timber areas. HUNTERS, it is up to YOU.

"Organized district" under the "Game Act" means all that part of the Province south of the 52nd parallel of latitude.

"Unorganized district" means any part of the Province north of the 52nd parallel of latitude.

NOTICE TO PROSPECTORS.

A prospector as defined under the "Game Act" is as follows:—

"Prospector" means a person who is the holder of a free miner's certificate under the "Mineral Act" or the "Placer-mining Act" and only while he is actually engaged personally in placer-mining or prospecting."

Any *bona-fide* prospector who is the holder of any licence to carry firearms under section 24 of the "Game Act" may during the open or close season in any unorganized district as defined above hunt and kill such game as he may require for his own use when in actual need of the same for food.

Any *bona-fide* prospector in an organized district as defined above may hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game during the open season when in actual need of the same for food, and in an organized district during the close season hunt and kill and retain in his possession any animals of the deer family, other than wapiti, of the male sex over one year of age, after having obtained a permit therefor.

NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT BIG-GAME HUNTERS.

Hunters who wish to ship their trophies from the Province must comply with the provisions of the "Game Act" and the Dominion Customs Regulations in that regard.

The following is a summary of the Customs and Game Regulations which are being furnished for the convenience of non-resident big-game hunters:—

"CUSTOMS REGULATIONS.

"Declaration Form in connection with the Export of Moose and Deer (copy of which form can be secured from any Express Agent) must be duly completed. With this declaration the hunter must personally appear before a Canadian Collector of Customs, and only when approved by him and form returned to the Express Company will shipment be permitted to leave Canada.

"Customs Invoices and Export Entry Forms must also be tendered with the shipment.

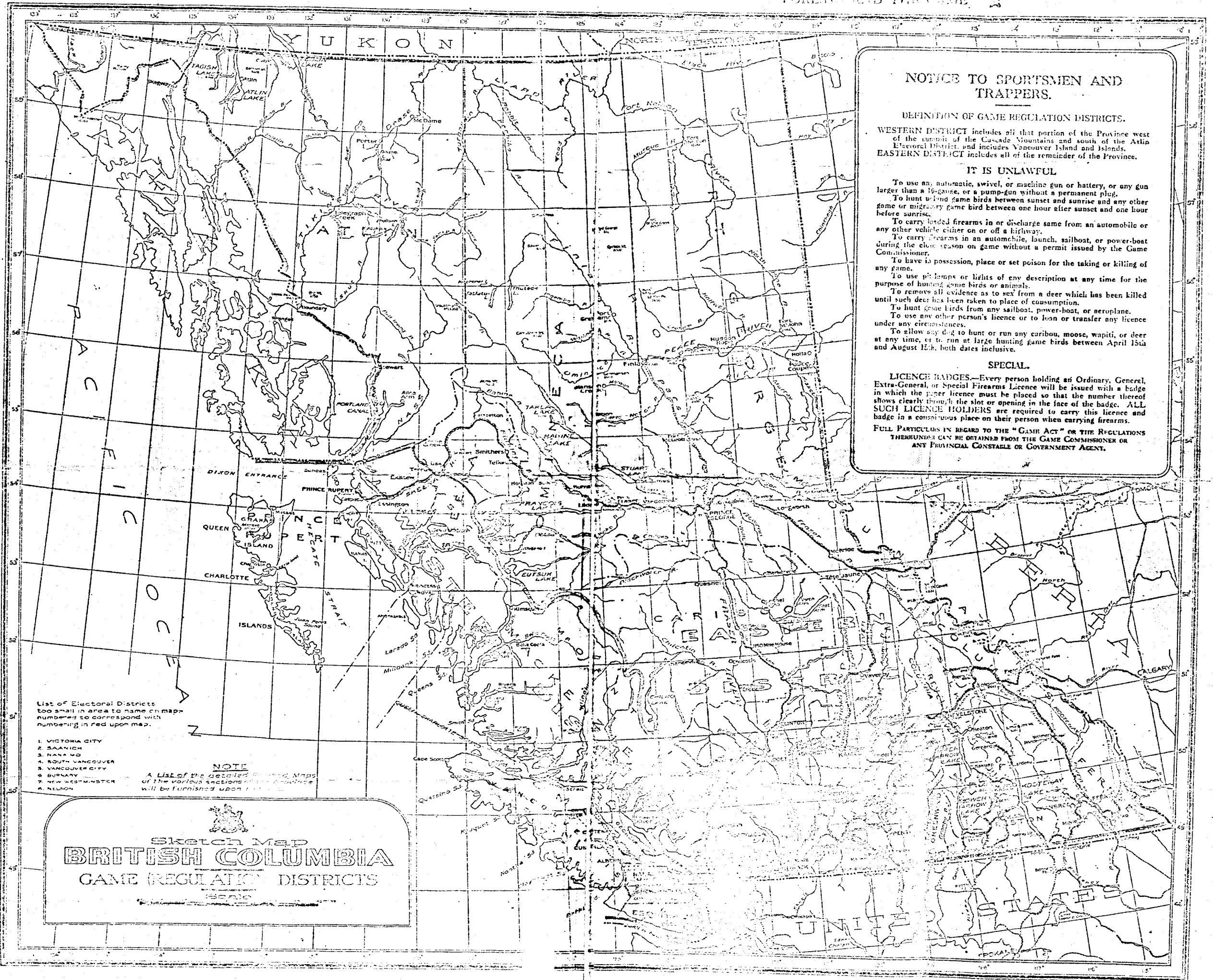
"NOTE.—Should there not be a Customs Officer at point of shipment, consign trophies to yourself at nearest Customs export point, have form completed on your arrival there, and deliver to the Depot Agent of the Express Company with request to forward shipment to destination."

"BRITISH COLUMBIA 'GAME ACT'.

"Any non-resident hunter, in order to export trophies secured, must obtain a permit for this purpose from any Game Warden, Provincial Police Constable, or Government Agent. This permit will be issued upon payment of fees due on trophies being exported as set forth in subsection (f) of section 24 of the "Game Act," and also on the face of non-resident general firearms and anglers' licences.

"Non-resident hunters must be accompanied by a British Columbia guide or a resident of the Province when hunting big game."

NOTICE TO SPORTSMEN AND TRAPPERS.

DEFINITION OF GAME REGULATION DISTRICTS.

WESTERN DISTRICT includes all that portion of the Province west of the summit of the Cascade Mountains and south of the Atlin Electoral District, and includes Vancouver Island and Islands.
EASTERN DISTRICT includes all of the remainder of the Province.

IT IS UNLAWFUL

- To use an automatic, swivel, or machine gun or battery, or any gun larger than a 16-gauge, or a pump-gun without a permanent plug.
- To hunt wild game birds between sunset and sunrise and any other game or migratory game bird between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise.
- To carry loaded firearms in or discharge same from an automobile or any other vehicle either on or off a highway.
- To carry firearms in an automobile, launch, sailboat, or power-boat during the close season on game without a permit issued by the Game Commissioner.
- To have in possession, place or set poison for the taking or killing of any game.
- To use pit-lamps or lights of any description at any time for the purpose of hunting game birds or animals.
- To remove all evidence as to sex from a deer which has been killed until such deer has been taken to place of consumption.
- To hunt game birds from any sailboat, power-boat, or aeroplane.
- To use any other person's licence or to loan or transfer any licence under any circumstances.
- To allow any dog to hunt or run any caribou, moose, wapiti, or deer at any time, or to run at large hunting game birds between April 15th and August 15th, both dates inclusive.

SPECIAL.

LICENCE BADGES.—Every person holding an Ordinary, General, Extra-General, or Special Firearms Licence will be issued with a badge in which the paper licence must be placed so that the number thereof shows clearly through the slot or opening in the face of the badge. **ALL SUCH LICENCE HOLDERS** are required to carry this licence and badge in a conspicuous place on their person when carrying firearms.
FULL PARTICULARS IN REGARD TO THE "GAME ACT" OR THE REGULATIONS THEREUNDER CAN BE OBTAINED FROM THE GAME COMMISSIONER OR ANY PROVINCIAL CONSTABLE OR GOVERNMENT AGENT.
