in handling frearms and be sure of what you are shooting at.

1. The prohibitions declared by section 18 of the "Game Act," being chapter 28 of the Statutes of British Columbia, 1935, as to the hunting, trapping, taking, wounding, and killing of game, are, subject to the provisions of sections 2 to 6, inclusive, of these regulations, hereby removed to the extent and within the period and limits and subject to the provisions hereinafter set out respectively, as follows:-

For the purpose of defining the open seasons. for big game, game birds, and trapping of fur-bearing animals, the Province shall be divided into two districts, to be known as the Western and Eastern Districts.

"Western District" shall mean and include all that portion of the Province situate and lying to the west of the summit of the Cascade Mountains and south of the Electoral District of Atlin, except that portion of the Electoral District of Skeena covered by the watershed of the Lakelse and Zymagotitz Rivers.

"Eastern District" shall mean and include all of the remainder of the Province.

EASTERN DISTRICT (OPEN SEASONS).

Big Game.

(a.) Moose, of the male sex, in the Electoral Districts of Atlin, Fort George, Peace River, Cariboo, Omineca; that portion of the Electoral District of Skeena situate and lying within the boundaries of the Eastern District; that portion of the Kamloops Electoral District situate and lying north of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway; that portion of the Electoral District of Lillooet situate and lying north of the 51st parallel of north latitude and east of the Fraser River, open season from September 1st, 1936, to December 15th, 1936, both

In the Electoral Districts of Fernie and Columbia (except that portion of the Columbia Electoral District situate and lying south of Toby Creek and west of the Columbia River), open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(b.) Caribou, of the male sex, in the Eastern District (except the Electoral Districts of Mackenzie and Skeena, and that portion of the Electoral District of Cariboo situate and lying to the west of the Fraser River, and that further portion of the Eastern District situate and lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway), open season from September 1st, 1936, to December 15th, 1936,

In that portion of the Eastern District situate and lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, open season from October 1st, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Electoral Districts of Fernie and Columbia (except that portion of the Columbia Electoral District situate and lying to the west of the Columbia River), and in those portions of the Similkameen and South Okanagan Electoral Districts situate and lying to the east of the Okanagan Lake and River, open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both date inclusive.

(d.) Mountain-sheep, of the male sex, that portion of the Eastern District situate and lying to the north of the 56th parallel of north latitude, open season from August 15th, 1936, to November 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

In that further portion of the Eastern District situate and lying south of the 56th paralle of north latitude and north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and in those portions of the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet situate and lying to the south of the main Chilcotin River and west of the Fraser River, and in the Electoral Districts of Fernie, Cranbrook, and Columbia, open season from September 1st, 1936, to November 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(e.) Mountain-goat, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof situate and lying to the north of the 56th parallel of north latitude, open season from August 15th, 1936, to December

In the remainder of the Eastern District (except the Electoral Districts of North and South Okanagan and Grand Forks-Greenwood), open season from September 1st, 1936, to December 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(f.) Bear (except White or Kermodei Bear), in the Eastern District, open season from September 1st, 1936, to June 30th, 1937, both dates

Provided that no Bear shall be trapped in the

(g.) Deer (Mule, White-tail, and Coast), bucks only, throughout the Eastern District (except White-tail Deer in the North and South Okanagan and Similkameen Electoral Districts and in the Grand Forks-Greenwood Electoral District west of the summit of the Midway Mountains), open season from September 15th. 1936, to December 15th, 1936, both dates in-

Provided that there shall be no open season on any members of the Deer family in those portions of the Eastern District described as follows:--

In that portion of the Columbia and Gran-brook Electoral Districts as follows: "Commencing at the north end of Kootenay Central Railway Bridge across Finlay Creek; thence north along the Kootenay Central Railway (Canadian Pacific Railway) to the intersection of said railway and the Columbia River Road; thence north-west along said road to the junction of the Finlay Creek Government Road;

thence south-west along said road to Finlay Creek; thence directly across said creek to its west bank; thence south-east along the west bank of Finlay Creek to the Kootenay Central Railway Bridge; thence across said bridge to the point of commencement."

In that portion of the Fernie Electoral District as follows: "Commencing at the junction of Morrissey Creek and Elk River; thence following the east and south banks of Elk River to a point one-half mile south of the junction of Wigwam and Elk Rivers; thence easterly following the summit of the watershed on the south side of Wigwam River to a point on the Wigwam River one-half mile south of the junction of said river and Lodgepole Creek; thence in an easterly direction following the summit of the watershed on the south side of Lodgepole Creek to the summit at the headwaters of said creek; thence northerly following the summit of the said watershed and westerly along the summit on the north side of said creek and Meadow Creek to a point on Morrissey Creek two miles north-east from the mouth of said creek; thence along the south bank of said creek to the point of commencement."

In that portion of the Grand Forks-Greenwood Electoral District as follows: "Commencing at the junction of Williamson Creek and the Kettle River; thence following the east shore-line of said river in a northerly direction to the junction of Kettle River and Losthorse thence along said creek to its source; thence following the height of land in a southerly direction to a point directly east of an unnamed lake forming the source of Williamson Creek; thence westerly to the east shoreline of said unnamed lake; thence along the south shore-line of said lake and Williamson Creek to the point of commencement."

In that portion of the Similkameen Electoral District as follows: "That portion thereof lying to the south of Whipsaw Creek and beween the Hope-Princeton Road and the Similkameen and Roche Rivers and Cambie Creek to where Cambie Creek enters the Three Brothers Mountain Game Reserve."

" Deer family," for the purpose of these regulations, shall mean and include Moose, Caribon, Deer, and Wapiti (Elk).

Fur-bearing Animals.

(h.) Beaver and Muskrats, in that portion cf the Eastern District situate and lying to the north of the 51st parallel of north latitude, open season from March 1st, 1937, to May 15th, 1937, both dates inclusive. In the remainder of the Eastern District, open season from March 1st, 1937, to April 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive.

Otter (except Sea-otter), in that portion of the Eastern District situate and lying to the season from March 1st, 1937, to May 15th, 1937 both dates inclusive. In the remainder of the Eastern District, open season from March 1st. 1937, to April 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive.

All other fur-bearing animals, throughout the Eastern District, open season from Novem ber 1st, 1936, to February 28th, 1937, both dates inclusive.

Game Birds.

(i.) Migratory Game Birds.—Seasons set and controlled under the "Migratory Birds Convention Act" through the Department of the Interior, Dominion Parks Branch, Ottawa. (j.) Grouse (Blue and Franklins only), i the Eastern District, in those portions thereof known as the Cariboo, Fort George, Peace River, Omineca, Skeena, and Atlin Electora

Districts, open season from September 15th 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive; in the remainder of the Eastern District (except Franklins Grouse in the Electora Districts of Kamloops and South Okanagan) men season from Sentember 15th, 1936, to October 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Ptarmigan, in the Eastern District, in those portions thereof known as the Cariboo, Fort deorge. Peace River, Omineca, Skeena, and Atlin Electoral Districts, open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive; in the remainder of the Eastern District (except the Electoral District of North Okanagan), open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 15th, 1936, both

Grouse (Ruffed, commonly called Willow), in the Cariboo, Fort George, Peace River, Omineca, Skeena, and Atlin Electoral Districts, situate and lying within the boundaries of the Eastern District, open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates nclusive: in the remainder of the Eastern District (except the Electoral Districts of Kamoops and South Okanagan and that portion of the Electoral District of North Okanagan situate and lying south and east of the second ary highway running east of Glenemma through Salmon River and Enderby Indian Reserves to the Shuswap River; thence easterly along the Shuswap River to Mabel Lake; thence northerly along the west shore-line of said lake to Wap Creek; thence northerly along Wap Creek to the northern boundary of the North Okanagan Electoral District), open season from otember 15th, 1936, to September 30th, 1936,

oth dates inclusive. (k.) Prairie-chicken or Sharp-tailed Grouse, in the Eastern District, in that portion thereof known as the Electoral Districts of Fort George and Peace River situate and lying to the north and east of the Rocky Mountains and in the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet, open season from September 15th, 1936, to October 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive; and in the

Electoral District of Salmon Arm, open season

from October 15th, 1936, to October 20th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(l.) Quail, in the Eastern District, in that ortion thereof known as the Electoral Districts of South Okanagan and Similkameen and that portion of the Electoral District of North aagan situat) and lying west of Okanagan Lake and south of Whiteman Creek, open season from October 15th, 1936, to November 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive, subject to the fol-

lowing proviso:--Provided that the hunting or shooting of Quail in the electoral districts mentioned in this clause shall, on the first three days of the open season—namely, October 15th, 1936, to October 17th, 1936, both dates inclusive—be between the hours of 12 a.m. (noon) to 4 p.m., and during the remainder of the open season on each day between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4 p.m.

(m.) Cock birds only, in that portion of the Salmon Arm Electoral District situate and lying north of the South Thompson River and Little Shuswap Lake, west of Adams River and Lake and south of Sinmax Creek, and that further portion of the Salmon Arm Electoral District (not previously defined herein) situate and lying to the south of the South Thompson River and Little Shus, ap Lake and west and south of the boundaries of the District Municipality and Municipality of Salmon Arm, open seaso from October 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds on y, in the Kamloops Electoral District, open season from October 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds only, in those portions of the electoral Distriction of Cariboo and Lillooet situ-Electoral Distthe Fraser River from ate and lyi 52nd parallel of north Riske Cre the southern boundary latitude o: of Lillooet on the south, ce on ten miles on the west side of the Fraser River and on the east side of said river to the eastern boundaries of the said electoral districts, open season from October 15th, 1936, to November 8th, 1936, both dates

Cock birds only, in that portion of the Electoral District of Nelson-Creston situate and lying to the south of a line drawn east and west and passing through Kootenay Landing, and in that portion (i the Grand Forks-Greenwood Electoral District situate and lying to the east of a line drawn north and south through the Station of Eholt on the Kettle Valley Railway, open season from October 14th, 1936, to October 18th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

The open season for the hunting or shooting of *Pheasants* as outlined in this clause shall be subject to the following proviso:-

Provided that the hunting or shooting of Pheasants in the Electoral Districts of North and South Okanagan and Similkameen shall, on the first three days of the open seasonnamely, October 15th, 1936, to October 17th, 1936, both dates inclusive—be between the hours of 12 a.m. (noon) to 4 p.m., and during the remainder of the open season on each day between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. In the remaining portions of the Eastern District provided with an open season, the hunting or shooting of Pheasants shall, on each or any day, be between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. Local time to be taken in each district.

(n.) European Partridge, in the Electoral Districts of North and South Okanagan, Kamloops, Salmon Arm, and Similkameen, open season from October 15th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

In the Electoral District of Nelson-Creston, in that portion thereof situate and lying to the south of a line drawn east and west through Kootenay Landing, open season for one day only-namely, October 18th, 1936. The open season for the hunting or shooting

of European Partridge outlined in this clause shall be subject to the following proviso:-Provided that the hunting or shooting of European Partridge in the Electoral Districts of Similkameen, North and South Okanagan shall, on the first three yes of the open senson —nan , October 15t, 1936, to October 17th,

1936, both dates inclusive—be between the hours of 12 a.m. (noon) to 4 p.m., and during the remainder of the open season in these and other districts mentioned herein, on each and any day, between the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Local time to be taken in each district.

(q.) Bear (except White or Kermodei Bear). throughout the Western District, open season from September 12th, 1936, to June 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive.

Provided that no Bear shall be trapped in the Western District.

(r.) Deer (Mule and Coast), bucks only, throughout the Western District, open season rom September 12th, 1936, to November 30th 1936, both dates inclusive.

Provided that the hunting, shooting, taking, or having in possession of Fallow Deer is pro-

Fur-bearing Animals. (s.) Beaver and Muskrats, in that portion of the Western District situate and lying to the north of the 51st parallel of north latitude (except Queen Charlotte Islands), open season from March 1st, 1937, to April 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive; in that portion of the Electoral District of Lillooet situate and lying to the east of a line drawn north and south (astronomic of Alta Lake Railway-station on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and including the watershed of the Upper Lillooet River, open season from December 1st, 1936, to April 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive: in the remainder of the Western District (except Beaver on Vancouver Island), open season from December 1st, 1936, to February 28th, 1937, both dates inclu-

Otter (except Sea-otter). in that portion of the Western District situate and lying to the north of the ölst parallel of north latitude (excent Queen Charlotte Islands), and in that portion of the Electoral District of Lillooet situate and lying to the east of a line drawn north and south (astronomic) of Alta Lake Railway-station on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and including the watershed of the Upper Lillooe: River, open season from December 1st, 1936, to April 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive: in the remainder of the Western District, open s son from December 1st, 1936, to February 28th, 1937, both dates inclusive.

Grouse (Blue only), in the Western District (except Hornby and Denman Islands, Vancouver Island, and the Islands Electoral District), open season from September 5th, 1936. to October 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive; on Vancouver Island and in the Islands Electoral District (except Mayne Island), open season from September 12th, 1936, to October 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Grouse (Ruffed, commonly called Willow) throughout the Western District, open season from October 17th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Ptarmigan, in the Prince Rupert Electora District, open season from September 5th, 1936 to October 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(v.) Quail (except Bob-white and Mountain Quail), in the Western District, on Vancouver Island in those portions thereof situate and lying to the south and east of Oyster River (except Oak Bay Municipality and that portion of the Alberni-Nanaimo Electoral District following a line from the summit of Beauford Range at Loon Lake; thence north-west to the head of Comox Lake; thence south-west to Ucluelet: thence south-east in a direct line to Clo-oose; thence north-east to the point of commencement), and on Saltspring Island, open season from October 17th, 1936, to November 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive: except thereout in the North Saanich District the following days, namely: October 18th, 25th, and November 1st, 8th, and 15th.

On Denman and Saturna Islands, open sea son from October 17th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(w.) Pheasants, cock birds only, in the Western District on Vancouver Island (except Oak Bay Municipality, that portion of Vancouver Island situate and lying north of Oyster River and that portion of the Alberni-Nanaimo Electoral District following a line from the summit of Reaufort Range at Loon Lake; thence northwest to the head of Comox Lake; thence southwest to Ucluelet; thence south-east in a direct line to Clo-oose; thence north-east to the point of commencement), and in the Islands Electoral District, open season from October 17th, 1936.

to November 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive: except thereout in the North Saanich District the following days, namely: October 18th, 25th, and November 1st, 8th, 15th.

Cock birds only, in that portion of the Alberni-Nanaimo Electoral District on Vancouver Island following a line from the summit of Beaufort Range at Loon Lake; thence northwest to the head of Comox Lake: thence southwest to Ucluelet; thence south-east in a direct line to Clo-oose; thence north-east to the point of commencement, open season from October 17th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates

Cock birds only, in the Western District, on the Mainland (except those portions known as the Squamish Valley and that area situate and lying between Howe Sound and Toba Inlet, and that further portion known as the Skeena Electoral District), open season from October 17th, 1936, to November 22nd, 1936, both dates in clusive.

Cock birds only, in that portion of the Mackenzie Electoral District situate and lying between Jervis Inlet and Sarah Point Mainland, open season from October 17th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

Cock birds only, in that portion of the Prince Rupert Electoral District known as Queen Charlotte Islands, open season from October 17th, 1936, to October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive.

The open season for the hunting or shooting of Pheasants as outlined in this clause shall be subject to the following proviso:—

Provided that the hunting or shooting of Pheasants in the portions of the Mainland provided with an open season shall, on each or any day between October 17th, 1936, and October 31st, 1936, both dates inclusive, cease at 5.30 p.m., and during the period November 1st, 1936, to November 22nd, 1936, both dates inclusive, cease at 5 p.m.

(x.) European Partridae, in the Western District, on Vancouver Island (except Oak Bay Municipality), in the North and South Saanich and Highland Districts, open season from October 17th, 1936, to November 1st, 1936, both dates inclusive; except thereout in the North Saanich District the following days, namely: October 18th, 25th, and November 1st.

Further, for the purpose of describing the Mighland District, the same is hereby defined as follows: "starting at the junction of the Finlayson Arm Road and the Malahat Highway: hence south along the Malahat and Island Highway to Atkin Road; thence east along Atkin Road to Thetis Lake Road: thence north along Thetis Lake Road to Munn's Road: thence easterly and southerly along Munn's Road to Prespect Lake Road; thence along Prospect Lake Road north and east to the right-of-way of the interurban line of the British Columbia Fig. tric Fallway; thence along said right-ofway to Tod Inlet Road; thence along Tod Inlet Road to Saanich Arm; thence along Saanich Arm to Goldstream Creek; thence following Goldstream Creek to the Finlayson Arm Road hence along the Finlayson Arm Road to the Malahat Highway."

BAG LIMITS (EASTERN AND WESTERN DISTRICTS).

In respect of big game throughout the Province as defined in the "Game Act," no person in that portion of the Province north of the main line of the Canadian National Railway, formerly known as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season more than two Mountain-sheep and two

Caribou, all of the male sex. In the remainder of the Eastern District provided with an open season on Mountainsheep and Caribou, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season more than one Mountain-sheep and one Caribou, all of the male sex.

Throughout the Province, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season more than one Wapiti (Elk), one Moose, all of the male sex. two Grizzly Bear and three Bear of any other species, and two Mountain-goat.

In the Eastern District, no person shall at any time kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season more than two Deer, and in the Western District three Deer, all of the male sex.

Game Birds.

No person shall in any district hereinafter designated kill or take on any one day any greater number of game birds than the daily hag limit hereinafter set out respectively; nor kill or take or have in their possession during the entire open season any greater number of game birds than the total bag limit so set out:-

Eastern District .- Pheasants (cock birds only) (except the Electoral Districts of Nelson-Creston, Grand Forks-Greenwood): Daily bag limit, 4; total bag limit, 15. In the Nelson-Creston and Grand Forks-Greenwood Electoral Districts: Daily bag limit, 2; total bag limit, 12. Quail: Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit,

Grouse and Ptarmigan (except Prairie-chicken or Sharp-tailed Grouse): Daily bag limit, 6 of one species or 12 of all species; total bag limit, 50 in the aggregate.

Prairie-chicken or Sharp-tailed Grouse: In the Electoral Districts of Fort George and Peace River—Daily bag limit, 6; total bag limit, 50. In the Electoral Districts of Cariboo and Lillooet-Daily bag limit, 4; total bag limit, 15. In the Electoral District of Salmon Arm—Daily bag limit, 4; total bag limit, 12.

European Partridge, in the Electoral Districts of Salmon Arm, Kamloops, North and South Okanagan, and Similkameen: Daily bag limit, 4; 1 tal bag limit, 15. In the Electoral District of Nelson-Creston (one day open season allowed only): Total bag limit, 2.

Western District. - Pheasants (cock birds only): Daily bag limit, 3; total bag limit, 20. European Partridge: Daily bag limit, 6; total bag 1 mit, 25.

Grouse: Daily bag limit, 6 of all species; total bag limit, 25 of all species. Ptarmigan: Daily bag limit, 6; total bag

Quail except Bob-white and Mountain Quail): Daily bag limit, 10; total bag limit, 50. Throughout the Province.-Migratory Game Birds: Big limits set under the "Migratory Birds Convention Act" by the Department of the Interior, Dominion Parks Branch.

Every person shall, upon the request of any Game Wa den or Constable, furnish satisfactory proof to him of the locality and dates on which any game was by him killed or taken; and, further, in respect to all game birds no one shall have in his possession at any one time more than two days' bag limit. 2. The prohibitions declared by subsection

(1) of section 26 of the "Game Act" as to the buying, selling, and having in possession of big game, so far as same relate to game lawfully killed or taken, are hereby removed to the extent and within the periods and limits and subject to the provisions hereinafter set out, as follows:—

(a.) Moose and Caribou, bulls over one year old, in the Electoral Districts of Atlin and Omineca, north of the 57th parallel of north latitude, f om September 1st, 1936, to December 15th, 1936, both dates inclusive.

(b.) Beur (except White or Kermodei Bear) in the Eastern District, from September 1st, 1936, to June 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive; in the Western District, from September 12th, 1936, to June 30th, 1937, both dates inclusive. . Provide? that no other big game be sold in

any part of the Province. 3. The open seasons declared by these regu-

lations shall not apply to the following parts of the Provices namely:-(a.) Kajen Island, in the Prince Rupert Electoral District.

(b.) (c.) That portion of the District Municipality of Eurnaby known as Central Park.

(d.) That portion of Nanaimo Harbour and vicinity described as follows: "Between highwater mark on Vancouver Island and a line drawn as follows: Commencing at Brechin Point, Departure Bay, near the City of Nanaimo; thence in an easterly direction to the most weserly point of Newcastle Island thence along the shore-line of Newcastle Island in a northerly, easterly, and southerly direction to the most easterly point of Newcastle Island; thence to the most westerly point of Protection Island: thence south-easterly to Gallows Point on Protection Island; thence to Jack's Point on Vancouver Island; thence in a westerly direction to Sevens and Wright's Shingle-mill on Vancouver Island.

(e.) That portion of Nelson-Creston Electoral District described as follows: "Commencing on the north shore of the West Arm of Kootenay Lake at Willow Point wharf; following he Duhamel or 6-Mile Creek Road to the intersection of the said Duhamel Creek Road with the First West Fork of Duhamel Creek; thence following the said West Fork to its source: thence in a southerly direction following the divide between Duhamel Creek and the West Arm of Kootenay Lake and Groham Creek to the mouth of said Groham Creek: thence across the West Arm of Kootenay Lake to the south shore of the said West Arm to a point known as the slaughter-house; thence following the south shore of the said West Arm in an easterly direction to a point opnosite Willow Point wharf; thence acress the said West Arm to the point of commencement."

Provided that the provisions of this subsection Provided that the provisions of this subsection or clause shall only apply in respect to the hunting of game birds.

(f.) That portion of the South Okanagan Electoral District in the vicinity of Kelowna known as Lot "M," Plan 1920, Osoyoos Division of Yale District.

(g.) That portion of the Salmon Arm Elec-

toral District in the vicinity of Sicamous, and commonly known as Sicamous Narrows, more particularly described as follows: ".Commencing at the south-east corner of Lot 525; thence north along the western shore-line of Sicamous Narrows to the main line of the Canadian Parific Re 'way: thence east along said reilway to the east shore-line of Sicamous Narrows; thence in a southerly direction following the east shoreline of Sicamous Narrows to the south-west corner of Lot 452; thence in a straight line across Sicamous Narrows to the point of commencement." Provided that the provisions of this subsection or clause shall only apply in respect of the hunting of game birds.

4. No person shall at any time kill or attempt to kill any Pheasant, Partridge, or Quail with a rifle, or hunt, as defined in section 2 of the Game Act," any game birds in any field or on or over any cultivated land by using an automobile or other vehicle thereon.

5. The open seasons declared by these regulations shall not apply to the hunting, taking, or having in possession of Quail, Pheasants Prairie-chicken (Sharp-tailed Grouse), or Part-2 ridge at any place when the surface of the ground at that place is covered with snow.

6. No person shall hunt, kill, or take any Moose, Caribou, Wapiti (Elk), or Deer while wimming, and the hunting, killing, or taking of any game by use of tracer bullets or tracer shot shells is prohibited.

The killing, taking, or trapping of fur-bearing animals by the use of spring-pole traps anywhere in the Province is prohibited. 7. There is no open season on any game

other than in the open districts and during the periods mentioned in the foregoing regulations. The electoral districts referred to in these regulations cover such districts as constituted at March 31st, 1936.

Organized district" under the "Game Act" means all that portion of the Province south of the 53rd narallel of latitud Inorganized district" means any part of the Province north of the 53rd parallel of lati-

LOADED FIREARMS. - ANY FIREARM HAVING LIVE AMMUNITION in the magazine or breech is considered as being loaded under the "Game Act."

NOTICE TO PROSPECTORS. A prospector as defined under the "Game " is as follows:—

"'Prospector' means a person who is the holder of a free miner's certificate under the 'Mineral Act' or the 'Placer-mining Act' and only while he is actually engaged personally in placer-mining or prospecting."

Any bona-fide prospector who is the holder of any licence to carry fire-arms under section 34 of the "Game Act" may during the open or close season in any unorganized district as defined above hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game for his own use when in actual need of the same for food.

Any bona-fide prospector in an organized dis trict as defined above may hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game during the open season when in actual need of the came for food, and in an organized district during the close season hunt and kill and retain in his possession any animals of the deer than wapiti, of the male sex over one year of age, after having obtained a permit therefor.

NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT BIG-GAME HUNTERS.

Hunters who wish to ship their trophies from the Province must comply with the provisions of the "Game Act" and the Dominion Customs Regulations in that regard.

The following is a summary of the Customs

and Game Regulations which are being fur-

nished for the convenience of non-resident biggame hunters:-

"CUSTOMS REGULATIONS. "Declaration Form in connection with the Export of Moose and Deer (conv of which form can be secured from any Express Agent) must be duly completed. With this declaration the hunter must personally appear before a Canadian Collector of Customs, and only when approved by him and form returned to the Express Company will shipment be permitted to leave Canada.

"Customs invoices and Export Entry Forms must also be tendered with the shipment.

"NOTE .- Should there not be a Customs Officer at point of shipment, consign trophies yourself at nearest Customs export point have form completed on your arrival there, and deliver to the Depot Agent of the Express Company with request to reforward shipment to destination.

"BRITISH COLUMBIA 'GAME ACT.' Any non-resident hunter, in order to export

trophies secured, must obtain a permit for this purpose from any Game Warden, Provincial Constable, or Government Agent. This permit will be issued upon payment of the fees due on trophies being exported as set forth in subsection (f) of section 34 of the 'Game Act.'

"Non-resident hunters must be accompanied by a British Columbia guide or a resident of the Province when hunting big game."

NOTICE TO SPORTSMEN.

All sportsmen are asked to co-operate by obtaining their firearms licences early in order to assist in eliminating the usual last-minute

After careful consideration it has been decided to ask the co-operation of all hunters to adopt a uniform distress signal as follows: "Any hunter in the field, in case of accident, distress, or otherwise, should, as a signal, fire three shots, allowing a space of five seconds between each shot, and should any one hear this signal he should reply by firing one ot. Distress signal to be given, if possible, until replied to. If, after a signal has been replied to, the party in need of assistance should repeat his first signal, but if not in need of assistance it will not be necessary to repeat signal."

Under amendments to the "Game-tag Regulations" a system was put into effect commencing with the season 1933, whereby any person purchasing deer-tags will be given credit in the following season for any unused tags, provided produces his old licence and the unused tags at the time he makes his application for a new licence, the number of the unused tags then being entered on the new licence.

From now on, if at all possible, fishermen obtaining resident anglers' licences will be supplied with copy of the British Columbia Special Fishery Regulations showing open seasons, etc.

A SPECIAL MESSAGE TO TRAPPERS.

The Game Department is extremely anxious to impress upon all trappers the necessity of preserving their fur-bearing animals, especially Beaver. The stock of Beaver has no doubt been reduced to a small number in some districts, and trappers should therefore refrain from trapping these animals unless they have a sufficient number on their trap-line to warrant trapping.

The Game Department will give trappers who to conserve their Beaver, as well as other fur-bearing animals, all the assistance in its power to protect their lines from poachers, but, on the other hand, will cancel the lines of those trappers who wilfully overtrap.

Registered trappers are particularly requested to adhere to the following:-

(1.) Do not overtrap; conserve the fur-bearing animals on your trap-line. (2.) Plainly mark your trap-line and refrain

from trespassing on any other trapper's line or on private land. (3.) Please make your application for renewal of your registered line and your return of catch covering the past season's operations after the expiration of your Special Firearms Licence, or at least before October 31st, as failure to renew or submit your return of catch

may place your application for registration in line for cancellation. (4.) Report every violation of the "Game Act" or Regulations immediately to the nearest Game Warden or Provincial Constable.

(5.) Suggestions for improvement of the Trapping Laws will gladly be received at all times and given careful consideration by the Game Department. (6.) Remember that the use of poison or pit-

lamps in taking fur is prohibited. (7.) Sale or transfer of registered trap-lines s prohibited except under certain conditions, and only on permission of the

Game Commission. (8.) White men and Indians are urgently requested to co-operate in conserving (9.) PREVENT FOREST FIRES.—Report any forest fire immediately to the near-

est Fire Warden, Game Warden, or Provincial Constable. (10.) Under 1931 amendments to the "Land Act," it is provided that where any land described in any application for preemption record comprises an area situate within the limits of a trap-line registered under the "Game Act." the Minister of Lands may direct that the pre-emption record shall be granted subject to the continued exercise by the registered holder of the trap-line of all his rights thereto or thereunder, including the exclusive right of tranning over that area, for a period not exceeding two years from the date of the preemption record, in which case the Min-ister of Lands shall cause a notation to be made on the certificate of preemption record for entry in the Land Office register and notice thereof to be

ALL HUNTERS ARE WARNED that any person responsible for the negligent or careless handling of firearms is liable to prosecution under the provisions of the Criminal Code.
