

GAME SHIPMENTS

No person shall make any shipment of any hig game, or any part thereof, or the eggs of any game bird, whether for export or to a destination within the Province, by any railway, steamhip, or express company, or other common carrier, without first preparing the shipment so that the package or receptacle used for the purposes of the shipment may be easily opened for examination of the contents, or else by preparing the shipment by planly marking on the outside of the package or receptacle or on a label securely attached thereto, a full description in detail of the contents; and no person shall make any shipment of any game, or any part description in detail of the conients; and no person shall make any shipment of any game, or any part thereof, or the egat of any game bird, whether for export or to a dectination within the Province, without first plainly marking on the package or receptacle used for purposes of the hipment, or on a label securely attached thereto, the names and addresses of the comisions and consignee of the shipment respectively, and also the number of any licence issued under the "Game Act" to the consignor.

FIREARMS or FISHING-TACKLE should not be carried without a licence. If you are in doubt, consult your nearest Game Warden.

After careful consideration it has been decided to ask the co-operation of all hunters to adopt a uniform DISTRESS SIGNAL, as follows: "Any hunter in the field, in case of accident, distress, or otherwise, should, as a signal, fire three shots, allowing a space of five seconds between each shot, and should anyone hear this signal, he should reply by firing one shot. DISTRESS SIGNAL to be given, if possible, until replied to. If, after a signal has been replied to, the party is in need of assistance, he should repeat his first signal, but if not repeat signal."

All nowtenens are asked to co-operate by obtain-

in need of assistance, it will not be necessary to repeat signal.

All sportsmen are asked to co-operate by obtaining their firearms licences early in order to assist in eliminating the usual last-minute rush.

Any resident firearms-leneth older must, in hunting deer, moose, mountain-goat, wapiti (elk), or pheasant, be in possession of the required tags for tagging any such animal or pheasant shot in accordance with the Game-tagging Regulations.

Everyone is requested to report recovery of any banded bird, surrendering the band, furnishing particulars of species and exe of bird, and place where and when taken.

No credit can be given for unused deer, goat, moose, or wapiti (elk) tags.

Fees: Deer-tag, 50 cents each; Goat or Moose-Eik tag, \$2.

The Game-tagging Regulations apply to resident and to non-resident hunters.

Hunters are requested by the Game Commission to refrain from killing female bear when it is known that they are accompanied by cubs. Do not shoot, take, or molest bear cubs. Remember it is unlawful to pick up or keep bear cubs and deer fawns.

From now on, if at all possible, fishermen obtain-

unlawful to pick up or keep bear cum and occ-fawns.

From now on, if at all possible, fishermen obtain-ing resident anglers' licences will be supplied with a copy of the British Columbia Special Fishery Regulations showing open seasons, etc.

Licence-holders hunting in a municipality are advised to acquaint themselves with any by-laws covering the discharge of firearms that may be in effect therein.

Keep your gun on "safe." Exercise care with fireurms.

NOTICE TO PROSPECTORS

A prospector as defined under the "Game Act"
as follows:—

A prospector as defined under the 'Oante Act'

"'Prospector' means a person who is the holder
of a free miner's certificate under the
'Mineral Act' or the 'Placer-mining Act'
and only while he is actually engaged personally in placer-mining or prospecting."
Any bona fide prospector who is the holder of
any licence to carry firearms under section 34 of
the "Game Act' may, during the open or close
season in any unorganized district as defined above,
hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game
for his own use when in actual need of same for
food while actually engaged in placer-mining or
prospecting.

Any bona fide prospector in an organized district as defined above may hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game during the open season when in actual need of same for food while actually engaged in placer-mining or prospecting, and in an organized district during the close season hunt and kill and retain in his possession any animals of the deer family, other than wapiti, of the male sex, over one year of age, after having obtained a permit therefor.

NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT BIG-GAME HUNTERS

"ANY NON-RESIDENT HUNTER, in order to export trophies secured, must obtain a permit for this purpose from any Game Warden or Government Agent. This permit will be issued upon payment of the fees due on trophies being exported as set forth in the regulations. Trophy fees are payable on any or all big game killed whether exported or otherwise."

NON-RESIDENTS of the Province hunting big game must be accompanied by a British Columbia licensed guide.

Hunters who wish to ship their trophies from the Province must comply with the provisions of the "Game Act" and the Canada Customs Regulations in that regard.

The following is a summary of the Customs and Game Regulations, which are being furnished for the convenience of non-resident big-game hunters:—

"Customs Invoices and Export Entry Forms must be tendered with the shapment. Note.—Should there not be a Customs Officer at point of shipment, consign trophies to yourself at nearest Customs export point, have form completed on your arrival there, and deliver to the Depot Agent of the Express Company with sequest to reforward shipment to destination." Study your regulations carefully.

IT IS UNLAWFUL:

To use any swivel, set-qua, machine gun, or battery, or any gun larger than a 10-gauge, or a pump or automatic shotgun without a permanent plug—magazine to hold two shriks.

To hunt any game between size hour after sunset and one hour before sunsee, or during the prohibited time or period measured in the Game Regulations.

To remove all evidence as to sex from any member of the deer family or mountain-sheep which has been killed until the careasy or careasys of said animals have been taken to place of consumption. When head is removed from careasy, some other evidence of sex must be vibble.

To hunt game from any sailboat, power-boat, or seronlane.

aeroplane.

To use any other person's licence or permit, or to loan or transfer any licence or permit under any circumstances.

To allow any dog to hunt or run any caribou, moose, wapit, or deer at any time, or to run at large hunting game birds between April 1st and July 31st, both dates inclusive.

To angle for fish or to carry fishing-tackle for the purpose of fishing in non-tidal waters without a licence.

To operate any aircraft for hunting, fishing, or trapping purposes contrary to the provisions of the regulations in this regard, which can be found later on in these regulations.

all re-operation is respectfully requested of licence-holders who have been requested to submit their game returns on a form supplied by the Game Commission.

"game" and "trout" shall be as defined in the "Game Act."

2. No person shall have in his possession, anywhere in the Province, at any one time, more trout than will in the aggregate amount to more than two days bag-limit, in accordance with the daily bag-limit set out in the British Columbia Special Fishery Regulations. (See exception in regulation

3. No person shall, anywhere in the Province, process by canning or bottling any game or trout until said game or trout has been the shad game of the residence of the angler or hunter as shown on his licence issued pursuant to the provisions of the "Game Act"; provided that this regulation shall be subject to any regulation passed under the Provincial "Fisheries Act."

GAME TAG REGULATIONS

(Orders in Council Nos. 1212 and 1766, approve May 30th, 1951, and July 18th, 1952.)

1. Each deer, moose, wapiti (elk), and mountaingoat as defined under the "Game Act" shail, immediately following the killing or taking hereof, have a seal which has not been previously used attached to the cateass thereof, and study used attached to the cateass thereof, and study seal that be securely and permanently attached to the horns or other part of the carcass sand must be locked by the person killing or taking the animal and to whom the seal has been issued in accordance with the provisions of these regulations.

2. Seals may be issued by a Game Warden, Constable, Government Agent, or any person authorized by the Game Commission, and the seal shall be in the shape and style as decided upon by the Game Commission, and shall be valid for the year in which said seal or seals are issued.

3. A fee of fifty cents (50e) shall be payable for every seal for a deer, and a fee of two dollars (\$2) for each moose-elk and mountain-goat seal.

4. The seal shall remain on the carcass of the deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-goat until the carcast has been removed or transported to the place where it is proposed to consume the carcass.

5. The transfer of any seal or seals by any holder of a licence under the "Game Act" to any person whatsoever is prohibited.

6. These regulations shall not apply in respect to any deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-goat killed by an Indian, prospector, surveyor, or farmer (on his own property only) for use for food pursuant to the provisions in that behalf contained in sections 7 to 10, inclusive, of the "Game Act."

7. Any person authorized to issue firearms licences, and from whom any of the seals mentioned herein have been describe the kind so purchased in the space provided for this purpose on the purchaser's firearms licence.

8. Any person found in possession of the carcass of a deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-goat to which a seal has not been securely and permanently attached a

Act."

10. Any game mentioned herein which has been taken in any Provincial park designated by the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Forests shall also be tagged or sealed as outlined in these regulations and with an extra tag or seal to be obtained from or supplied by the British Columbia Forest Service of the Department of Lands and Forests under any regulation of that Department. (Nore.—Under Provincial Parks Regulations, 1951, as amended by Regulation 150, made by Order in Council No. 1235, approved May 20th, 1955, the Minister of Lands and Forests requires that no deer, moose, caribou, goat, or bear shall be removed from Wells Gray Provincial Park except when such game bears a scaled tag, obtainable, without charge, from the Park Ranger, or from patrolmen stationed at Mahood Lake, Clearwater Lake, and Murile Lake.)

11. (a) All of the provisions of these regulations shall apply to the tagging or scaling of the leg of each pheasant that has been shot, killed, or taken. The fee for each pheasant tag-card, which shall consist of five (5) tags, shall be fifty cents (50e). No person shall make application for, have it his possession at any time, or be issued with more pheasant-tags than the season's limit set out in the Game Regulations.

(b) Each and every person shooting, killing, or taking a pheasant shall immediately upon taking possession of same affix around the leg, above the spur, of the said bird one of the tags issued in his favour, and such tag must be securely locked by and person. The said tag must remain on the pheasant until it is taken to the place where it is proposed to consume the said bird.

(c) For the purpose of these regulations, any pheasant having a mutitated or tampered tag on its leg shall be deemed to be an untagged pheasant.

"EASTERN DISTRICT" shall mean and include all of the remainder of the Province.

Provided, for the purpose of the open seasons on migratory game birds, that portion of the Skeens River and its watershed situate and lying within the boundaries of the Skeens Electoral District east of a line drawn north and south (astronomic) through the mouth of Khyex River be construed and be considered as lying within the Eastern District.

Further, for the purpose of these regulations, the Western and Eastern Districts shall be divided into game management areas as follows:—

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 4" shall mean and include that portion of the Western District situate and lying north of the 52nd parallel of north latitude, except all of the Queen Charlotte Island."

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 5" shall mean and include all of the Queen Charlotte Islands.

EASTERN DISTRICT

"GAME MANACEMENT AREA No. 6" shall mean and include the Yale Electoral District (except that portion bounded on the south by Highway No. 8 between Spences Bridge and Merritt, on the east side by Highway No. 5 between Merritt and Kamloops), and that portion of the Kamloops Electora! District situate and lying south of the South Thompson River and east of Highway No. 5 between Merritt and Kamloops, and that portion of the Salmon Arm Electoral District situate and lying south of the South Thompson River and Shuswap Lake.

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 13" shall mean and include that portion of the Kamloops Electoral District situate and lying to the north of the South Thompson River and to the east of the North Thompson River, Clearwater River, Game Management Area No. 17, and that portion of the Salmon Arm Electoral District situate and lying north of the South Thompson River and Shuswap Lake.

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 14" shall mean and include those portions of the Lillooet and Cariboo Electoral Districts situate and lying east of the Fraver River, south the south shoreline of Quesnel River, Quesnel Lake, and the east arm thereof; that portion of the Yole Electoral District bounded on the south by Highway No. 8 between Spences Bridge and Merritt and on the east by Highway No. 5 between Merritt and Kamioops; those portions of the Kamioops Electoral District situate and lying west of Highway No. 5 between Merritt and Kamioops, and west of the North Thompson and Clearwater Rivers (except Game Management Area No. 17).

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 15" shall mean and include that portion of the Lillooet Electoral District situate and lying west of the Fraser River and east of the summit of the Cas-

Fraser River and east of the summit of the Cascade Mountains.

"GAME MANAGEMENT AREA No. 16" shall
mean and include that portion of the Cariboo
Electoral District situate and Jying to the west of
the Fraser River and to the south of the Chilcotin
River, Chilanko River, Tatla Lake Creek, Tatla
Lake, and the main highway between Tatla Lake
and Bella Coola.

"GAME MANALEMENT AREA No. 21" shall mean and include all of the Peace River Electoral District and all that part of the Province stude and lying to the north of the 56th parallel of north lattitude.

All dates mentioned in these regulations are inclusive and apply, unless otherwise noted, to the calendar with the provident than in the open districts and during the period mentioned in these regulations.

The open seasons declared by these regulations shall cease to be in effect that any area covered by a closure order issued by the Furest Service of the Department of Lands and Forests and shall continue to be ineffective during the period covered by such forest-closure order.

All times mentioned in these regulations refer to Pacific Standard time unless otherwise specifically mentioned.

The electoral districts mentioned in these regulations cover such districts as constituted at the time of the passing of these regulations.

The Migratory Came Bird Seasons in these regulations are subject to confirmation by Federal Order in Council.

REGULATIONS COVERING THE USE OF THE BOW AND ACKON IN THE HINT.

ING OF GAME IN HEITISH COLUMBIA.

(Order in Council No. 1467, approved juine 27th, 1950.)

1. Any person hunting game with a bow and arrow, or who is carrying the same for the purpose of so hunting, must be in possession of the required licence as set forth in the "Game Act."

2. A how and arrow shall only be used in the hunting of hig game and grouse.

3. No how shall be used with a pull of less than forty (40) pounds at full draw.

4. The use of poison or exploding arrows is 4. The use of poison or exploding arrows sion or carry any of the said arrows while hunting same.

5. Blunt arrows must have a flat face of not less than three-eighths (4a) of an inch, and broadheads must be at least seven eighths (4b) of an inch wide, at widest point, and sturdily constructed of suitable metal material, and well sharpened.

REGULATIONS CONTROLLING THE USE OF AIRCRAFT AND CERTAIN MOTOR-VFHICLES IN HUNTING, FISHING, AND TRAPPING.

"(2) Any person found in the vicinity of any forest or woodland, or in any locality where game is usually found, with a head-light of any description and a firearm or other similar weapon in his possession, or found hunting any game with a pitlamp, spot-light, or other light in his possession, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be tiable to immediate arrest without warrant by a Game Warden or Constable.

"(3) No person shall within the Province publish any advertisement offering for sale head-lights or pit-lamps for use in contravention of the provisions of this section."

BOUNTY REGULATIONS

1. Subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, payment shall be made to any person who is the holder of a licence to carry firearms under the "Game Act" or to an Indian who is a resident of the Province, in respect to each cougar killed within the Province, a bounty of twenty dollars (\$2.0), provided that when a bonus or registered cougar-hunter who has been appointed in accordance with these regulations personally kills a cougar within the Province he shall be entitled to receive a bonus of twenty dollars (\$2.0) over and above the usual bounty set out herein.

2. Bountes shall not be paid on any cougar unless the whole pelt of, the animal is produced with an application for bounty.
