

> DEFINITION OF ANTLERLESS ANIMAL


An antierless animal is a female or young animal of the year bearing no visible bony antiers. The small skin- or haircovered protuberances on male fawns and calves do not constitute antlers. Such animals are antierless for the purpose of these regulations. Over one year of age refers to a member of the deer family bearing visible antlers.



EVIDENCE OF SEX AND IDENTITY A safe easy way to comply with the evidence of sex regu-tions. Cut to one side of scrotum* when opening animal if gutting.

Assist in preventing hunting accidents. Report any person found carrying or using a firearm carelessly.



GAME SHIPMENTS

No.person shall make any shipment of any big game, or any part thereof, or the eggs of any game bird, whether for export or to a destination within the Province, by any railway, steamship, or express company, or other common carrier, without first preparing the shipment so that the package or receptacle used for the purposes of the shipment may be easily opened for examination of the contents, or else by preparing the shipment by plainly marking on the outside of the package or receptacle, or on a label securely attached thereto, a full description in detail of the contents; and no person shall make any shipment of any game, or any part thereof, or the eggs of any game bird, whether for export or to a destination within the Province, without first plainly marking on the package or receptacle used for purposes of the shipment, or on a label securely attached thereto, the names and addresses of the consignor and consignee of the shipment respectively, and also the number of any licence issued under the "Game Act" to the consignor.

Ask permission to hunt private property. Point firearm at game only.

NOTICE TO SPORTSMEN

"UNORGANIZED DISTRICT" means any part of the Province north of the 53rd parallel of

After careful consideration it has been decided to ask the co-operation of all hunters to adopt a uniform DISTRESS SIGNAL, as follows: "Any hunter in the field, in case of accident, distress, or otherwise, should, as a signal, fire three shots, allowing a space of five seconds between each shot, and should anyone hear this signal, he should reply by firing one shot. DISTRESS SIGNAL to be given, if possible, until replied to. If, after a signal has been replied to, the party is in need of assistance, he should repeat his first signal, but if not in need of assistance, it will not be necessary to repeat signal."

All sportsmen are asked to co-operate by obtain.

All sportsmen are asked to co-operate by obtaining their firearms licences early in order to assist in eliminating the usual last-minute rush.

Any resident firearms-licence holder must, in hunting deer, moose, mountain-goat, wapiti (elk), or pheasant, be in possession of the required tags for tagging any such animal or pheasant shot in accordance with the Game-tagging Regulations.

Everyone is requested to report recovery of any banded bird, surrendering the band, furnishing particulars of species and sex of hird.

any banded bird, surrendering the band, fur-nishing particulars of species and sex of bird, and place where and when taken. No credit can be given for unused deer, goat, moose, or wapiti (elk) tags.

Fees: Deer-tags, 50 cents each; Goat or Moose-Elk tag, \$2. The Game-tagging Regulations apply to resident and to non-resident hunters.

Hunters are requested by the Game Commission to refrain from killing female bear when it is known that they are accompanied by cubs. Do not shoot, take, or molest bear cubs. Remember it is unlawful to pick up or keep bear cubs and deer fawns.

From now on, if at all possible, fishermen obtaining resident anglers' licences will be supplied with a copy of the British Columbia Special Fishery Regulations showing open seasons, etc.

Licence-holders hunting in a municipality are advised to acquaint themselves with any by-laws covering the discharge of firearms that may be in effect therein.

Keep your gun on " safe." Exercise care with firearms.

NOTICE TO PROSPECTORS

A prospector as defined under the "Game Act"

as follows:

"'Prospector' means a person who is the holder
of a free miner's certificate under the 'Mineral Act' or the 'Placer-mining Act' and
only while he is actually engaged personally
in placer-mining or properties."

only while he is actually engaged personally in placer-mining or prospecting."

Any bona fide prospector who is the holder of any licence to carry firearms under section 34 of the "Game Act" may, during the open or clove season in any unorganized district as defined above, hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game for his own use when in actual need of same for food while actually engaged in placer-mining or prospecting.

Any bona fide prospector in an organized district as defined above may hunt and kill and retain in his possession any game during the open season when in actual need of same for food while actually engaged in placer-mining or prospecting, and in an organized district during the close season hunt and kill and retain in his possession any animals of the deer family, other than wapit, of the male sex, over one year of age, after having obtained a permit therefor.

NOTICE TO NON-RESIDENT BIG-GAME HUNTERS

"Any NON-RESIDENT HUNTER, in order to Any NON-RESIDENT HUNTER, in order to export trophies secured, must obtain a permit for this purpose from any Game Warden or Government Agent. This permit will be issued upon payment of the fees due on trophies being exported as set forth in the regulations. Trophy fees are payable on any or all his game killed whether

the "Game Act" and the Canada Customs Regulations in that regard.

GAME-TAG REGULATIONS (Orders in Council Nos. 1212 and 1766, approved May 30th, 1951, and July 18th, 1952.)

1. Each deer, moose, wapiti (elk), and mountaingoat as defined under the "Game Act" shall, immediately following the killing or taking thereof, have a seal which has not been previously used attached to the carcass thereof, and such seal must be securely and permanently attached to the horns or other part of the carcass and must be locked by the person killing or taking the animal and to whom the seal has been issued in accordance with the provisions of these regulations.

2. Seals may be issued by a Game Warden

2. Seals may be issued by a Game Warden, Constable, Government Agent, or any person authorized by the Game Commission and the seal shall be in the shape and style as decided upon by the Game Commission, and shall be valid for the year in which said seal or seals are issued.

3. A fee of fifty cents (50¢) shall be payable for

every seal for a deer, and a fee of two dollars (\$2) for each moose-elk and mountain-goat seal. 4. The seal shall remain on the carcass of the deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-goat until the carcass has been removed or transported to the place where it is proposed to consume the carcass.

5. The transfer of any seal or seals by any holder of a licence under the "Game Act" to any person whatsoever is prohibited.

6. These regulations shall not apply in respect to any deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-geat killed by an Indian, prospector, surveyor, or farmer (on his own property only) for use for food pursuant to the provisions in that behalf contained in sections 7 to 10, inclusive, of the "Game Act."

7. Any person authorized to issue firearms licences, and from whom any of the seals mentioned herein have been purchased, shall note the numbers of the seals and describe the kind so purchased in the space provided for this purpose on the purchaser's firearms licence.

8. Any person found in possession of the carcass of a deer, moose, wapiti (elk), or mountain-goat to which a seal has not been securely and permato which a seal has not been securely and permanently attached and locked shall be deemed to have committed an offence against these regulations. 9. The seal or seals referred to herein must be

10. Any game mentioned herein which has been taken in any Provincial park designated by the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Forests shall also be tagged or sealed as outlined in these regulations and with an extra tag or seal to be obtained from or supplied by the British Columbia Forest Service of the Department of Lands and Forests under any regulation of that Department.

(Note. — Under Provincial Parks Regulations, 1951, as amended by Regulation 15p, made by Order in Council No. 1235, approved May 20th, 1955, the Minister of Lands and Forests requires that no deer, moose, caribou, goat, or bear shall be removed from Wells Gray Provincial Park except when such game bears a sealed tag, obtainable, without charge, from the Park Ranger, or from patroimen stationed at Mahood Lake, Clearwater Lake, and Murtle Lake.)

11. (a) All of the provisions of these regulations shall apply to the tagging or sealing of the leg of each pheasant that has been shot, killed, or taken. The fee for each pheasant tag-card, which shall consist of five (5) tags, shall be fifty cents (50¢). No person shall make application for, have in his possession at any time, or be issued with more pheasant-tags than the season's limit set out in the Game Regulations.

(b) Each and every person shooting, killing, or taking a pheasant shall immediately upon taking possession of same affix around the leg above the

("G.M.A." means game management area as set out in regulations.)

The preionitions declared by section 18 of the "Coame Act," being chapter 135 of the "Revied Statotes of British Columna, 1948," as 10 the hunting, possession, wounding, and killing of game, are, surgect to the provisions of sections 2 to 8, inclusive, of these regulations, hereby removed to the extent and within the period and the limits and subject to the provisions hereby removed to the extent and within the period and the limits and subject to the provisions hereins rest out respectively, as follows:—

For the purpose of defining the open seasons for big game and game birds, the Province shall be divided into two districts, to be known as the Western and Eastern Districts and also into game management areas as set out herein.

PREPARATION OR CARE OF GAME MEAT

BIG GAME

1. Go prepared. The following equipment is either essential or desirable in the care of a biggame carcass: Hunting knife, belt axe, 30 feet of 44-inch rope, some twine, several pieces of clean wiping-cloth, four (4) muslin or cloth sacks, each arge enough to bold a quarter of the animal, and several pieces of old but clean canvas for use when carrying the meat on pack-horses.

2. As soon as possible after the animal is shot insert the knife at the point of the brisket with back of the blade against the breasthone, point the tip toward the backbone at the top of the shoulders just uncer the windippe, and cut diagonally toward toward the head to sever the large blood-vessels in the neck. If possible, first turn the animal with its head down-hill so that it will bleed freely. Coast deer may be draped across several logs to provide

just uncer the windpipe, and cutt diagonality forward to head to sever the large blood-vessels in the neck. It possible, first turn the animal with its head down-hill so that it will bleed treely. Coast deer may be draped across several logs to provide the same effect.

3. After the animal has bled well, turn the careass with head up-hill and open it from the vent to the throat. Use the hand axe to break the pelvic bone and breastbone. Be careful not to puncture the intestine or paunch. If the animal is first placed on an incline, the paunch and intestines will roll out more freely. Slip your knife forward between the ribs and the paunch (stomach) and cut the muscular diaphragm loose. Cut the windpipe and guillet free as far forward as possible. Take the windpipe and guillet in the left hand and puil backward, at the same time cutting free from the careass that portion that tends to hold.

4. In the case of deer, place the careass in position to drain. Wipe the inside of the careass drawing and cloth. Do not wash with water. Remove the dark tuffs of hair on the hind legs. These are glandular areas which secrete a foul-smelling material that may contaminate the meat. Before using your knife again, you should carefully wipe it clean. The testes left on the careass will cause no harm.

5. In case the careass cannot be hung up or is not removed to camp immediately, spread it open with a short spreader-stick across the chest to cool as rapidly as nossible and oreven meat from estimates to a small value and a second as rapidly as nossible and oreven meat from estimates to occur a stand the same and an extending. CHECK YOUR EYESIGHT

Most people who have defective vision do not know it. It has been established that your chances of being involved in a hunting accident are more than doubled with defective vision.

Hunt within your visual bounds. If you hunt or use firearms, you owe it to yourself and to your fellow hunters to know the condition of your eyes. It is suggested, for safety purposes only, that a hunter should have periodic examinations made of his entire visual apparatus. If glasses have been prescribed to improve your distance vision, were them.

Take every precaution in preventing hunting occidents. Remember and always believe the firearm you are cartiving is loaded, dangerous, and must be handed with every care.
